

Farewell Dinner Held For Padua High Professor

Watkins Glen — "It is not an easy job. It is not chosen by those who go there and teach," declared Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph A. Balcerak, pastor of St. Stanislaus Church, Rochester, at the departure ceremonies for Rev. Terrence Pinkowski, O.F.M., of Watkins-Glen Padua High School of the Franciscan Fathers.

Father Terrence is leaving Nov. 15 for the Philippine Mission Field. Some 250 attended the rituals at the Padua Chapel.

Also taking part in the service was Rev. Claude Zabinski, O.F.M., Padua High School rector.

Father Terrence is going to a far off mission. Msgr. Balcerak said, "The grace of God will help him, will give him strength to overcome the hardships for this we gather here in prayer that he may persevere."

"All of us assembled here, the Fathers, students of this school and friends will remember Father Terrence in our prayers. May he go with confidence to meet the hard work he is about to undertake."

FOLLOWING the religious services, Father Terrence was the guest of honor at the annual Jimmy Franzese Memorial Banquet in the Padua dining room. Father Terrence was presented with a gift of \$1,000 which he will use in the mission field. In the Philippines, he will become a faculty member at Christ The King College. At Padua, Father Terrence was the head of departments.

He will take to the islands a 500 pound church bell which he leaves by boat from the San Francisco harbor. The bell came from St. Stanislaus Parish in Wilkes Barre, Pa., a gift of the English and dramatic department of that church.

When a new church was constructed the bell was replaced. Mary of the Glen Franciscan Fathers have served in the Pennsylvania Church.

The chalice, which Father Terrence will use daily in the celebration of the Mass, is in memory of the late Harry J. Sultz, prominent Watkins Glen resident. When a member of the Knights of Columbus passes away, the order purchases a chalice in memory of the departed knight. Mr. Sultz was a fourth degree member of the order. The chalice was presented to Father Terrence by the Sultz family.

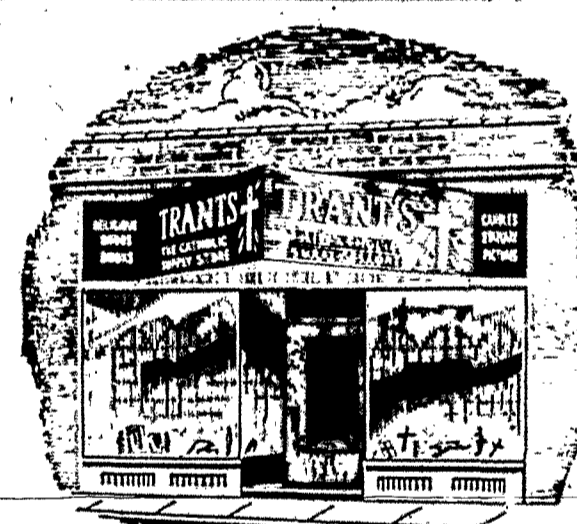
