Bishop Speaks At CYO Final Report Meeting

Bishop Kearney was the principal speaker at the Catholic Youth Organization's final report meeting at Columbus Civic Center last night. Although detailed reports were not available at press time, indications were that the drive had exceeded its quota of 3,300 members.

More than 350 workers were engaged in the campaign, which began Oct. 2nd. Proceeds of the membership drive will be used to finance the CYO year-around programs of supervised recreation for boys and girls in this area. Bishop Kearney's talk dealt with the value of this type of service to the community.

THE CAMPAIGN was under the direction of general chairman (Rev.) A. Dale, who was unable to attend the closing dinner because of a business meeting in California.

He sent a congratulatory telegram to Rev. Eugene H. McFarland, director of the CYO and expressed his appreciation of the work of Mrs. Lynn French, Joseph P. Gioia and Martin F. Birmingham, chairman of the principal divisions of the campaign.

Prizes awarded to workers who achieved the largest percentage of quotas included a women's suit, man's suit, electric clock and turkey.

Vatican Urges Mission Day Generosity

Vatican City, Oct. 17. — A high ranking official of the Sacred Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith has appealed to Catholics throughout the world for full support of Mission Day on October 19.

Archbishop Pietro Sigismondi, the congregation's secretary and president of the Pontifical Missionary Works said this year's call for money and funds "perhaps has never been as urgently needed as now."

He said that the "missionary world is in full movement" although persecution in some areas has attempted to destroy the faith.

"But the grace that laughs at curtains of iron or bamboo upholds the faith of martyrs and confessors whose sacrifice, bloody or not, is the seed of Christians," he declared.

Referring to the contributions of many missionary congregations and societies, Archbishop Sigismondi said "the total of contributions and sacrifices by these holy groups no longer is sufficient for the growing needs of the nations."

"IN THEIR NAME, in the name of the men who have consecrated their lives to them, in the name of our brothers in the faith in the lands of the missions, I come to ask your cooperation," he said.

The Archbishop urged all Catholics to "pray for the missions."

'Blue Baby' Refugee Dies

New York — (RNS) — Four skilled surgeons performed a delicate five-hour operation to save the life of nine-year-old Karoly Nyiray, but the Hungarian refugee's great little heart finally gave way and he died at St. Luke's Hospital here, a "blue baby" victim.

The operation arranged by Catholic Relief Services National Catholic Welfare Conference, was held to repair a hole in the boy's heart that he had suffered since birth. The surgeons managed to mend the defect, but as the entire operating-room team of more than 20 people made every effort to sustain the boy's life, the heart slowed, beat irregularly and finally stopped.

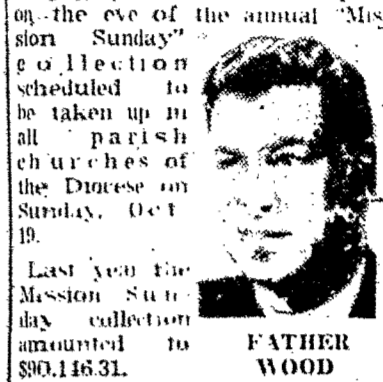
Highest In History

Diocese Donated \$371,672 To Missions In 1957

Catholics of the Rochester Diocese contributed in 1957 the highest amount ever given here for the Church's worldwide mission program.

The total is an impressive \$371,672.11, as reported today by Rev. George S. Wood, diocesan director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

In 1956, diocesan contributions to the missions totaled \$302,018. Father Wood stated the 1957 propagation of the Faith report on the eve of the annual "Mission Sunday" collection.

Last year the Mission Sunday collection amounted to \$80,146.31. He asked that this year's efforts be made in memory of Pope Pius XII.
