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Bishop Speaks At CYO Final Report Meeting

Bishop Kearney was the principal speaker at the Catholic Youth Organization's 24th annual membership campaign at Columbus Civic Center last night. Although detailed reports were not available at press time, indications were that the drive had exceeded its quota of 3,300 members.

More than 350 workers were engaged in the campaign which began Oct. 2nd. Proceeds of the membership drive will finance the CYO year-around programs of supervised recreation for boys and girls of this area. Bishop Kearney's talk dealt with the value of this type of service to the community.

THE CAMPAIGN was under the direction of general chairman John A. Dale, who was unable to attend the closing dinner because of a business meeting in California.

He sent a congratulatory telegram to Rev. Eugene H. McFarland, director of the CYO and expressed his appreciation of the work of Mrs. Lynn French, Horace P. Glida and Martin F. Birmingham, chairman of the principal divisions of the campaign.

Prizes awarded to workers who achieved the largest percentages of quotas included a woman's suit, man's suit, electric clock and turkey.

U.S. Church Gains Under Pope Pius

Washington (UPI)—At the times of Pope Pius XII's election in 1958 there were 112 archdioceses and dioceses, one apostolic vicariate and one independent abbey here.

Today there are 141 sees including the archdioceses and vicariates, an increase of 27.

In addition to the 27 new sees, Pius XII raised seven dioceses to the rank of archdioceses—Denver; Hartford; Indianapolis; Kansas City, Kan.; Omaha; Seattle and the Byzantine Rite See of Philadelphia. The new sees included the first dioceses in Alaska and Hawaii, as well as the new Archdiocese of Washington.

In 1957 the Military Ordinariate was given the status of a diocese. During Pius XII's pontificate the number of Catholics in the United States increased from 21,107,000 to 30,024,000, an increase of 14,617,000 or 68 percent, more than twice the rate of growth of the country's total population in the same period.

Students Hike To Jesuit Shrine

Midland (UPI)—Twenty-two students assisted at a Diocesan Mass here after walking 90 miles on a pilgrimage from Toronto to the Shrine of the North American Martyrs near this city.

The second annual Student Cross Pilgrimage took five days and was led by Father J. A. Trovato, C.S.B., chaplain of the pilgrimage. The pilgrims, 10 men and 12 women, carried a 30-pound oak cross on the last 10 miles of the trip.

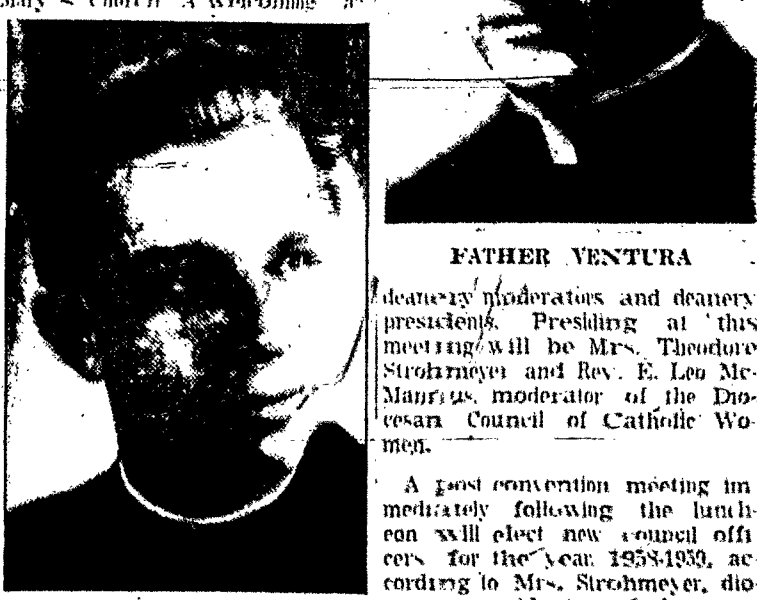
DCCW Schedules Panel Discussion

'Blue Baby' Refugee Dies

New York (UPI)—Four skilled surgeons performed a delicate five-hour operation to save the life of nine-year-old Karoly Nyiray, but the Hungarian refugee's great little heart finally gave way and he died at St. Luke's Hospital here, a "blue baby" victim.

The operation arranged by Catholic Relief Services-National Catholic Welfare Conference, was held to repair a hole in the boy's heart that he had suffered since birth. The surgeons managed to mend the defect, but, as the operating-room team of more than 20 people made every effort to sustain the boy's life, the heart slowed, beat irregularly and finally stopped.

Highest In History Diocese Donated \$371,672 To Missions In 1957

Catholics of the Rochester Diocese contributed in 1957 the highest amount ever given here for the Church's worldwide mission program.

The total is an impressive \$371,672, as reported today by Rev. George S. Wood, diocesan director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.

In 1956, diocesan contributions to the missions totaled \$302,048. Father Wood issued the 1957 Propagation of the Faith report on the eve of the annual Mission Sunday.

A collection scheduled to be taken up in all parish churches of the Diocese on Sunday, Oct. 19.

Last year the Mission Sunday collection amounted to \$90,146.31.

The report also includes \$1,311,444.40 through wills and \$34,484.64 in Mass stipends distributed to missionary priests. Children in the schools raised \$28,637.50 through the Holy Childhood Association. Miscellaneous income amounted to \$12,355.
