

# St. Mary's Women's Board Marks Silver Anniversary

Bishop Kearney was the celebrant of the Mass and guest speaker at the 25th anniversary celebration of the women's board of St. Mary's Hospital Wednesday.

The Bishop was assisted by Rev. Paul G. Wohrab, hospital chaplain, at the Mass said in the chapel. Monsignor John J. Marney was present in the sanctuary.

MRS. WILLIAM W. Winans Jr. was chairman of the affair, at which her mother, Mrs. Charles P. Paisley was the guest of honor. Louis A. Langie was toastmaster.

The Bishop said in part:

"Although the monetary result of the women's efforts is outstanding and of great assistance, it should be remembered that the personal service given by the board members is of greater value." Bishop Kearney said.

The Bishop praised the Sisters of Charity and asked every one to continue to cooperate with the administration in effecting any

proposed changes as 'changes indicate the vitality and progress of any organization.'

The achievements of the Sisters since their humble beginning years ago were cited and the Bishop said this community is in the Sister's debt "for their loving kindness to the sick and injured."

Founded in 1933, the board was formed to provide an aide service to the hospital and to assist with the demands of the school of nursing.

MRS. FRANK P. Toolan, chairman of the 64 branches comprising 775 members presided at the breakfast given by Sister Teresa and the Sisters of Charity who are sponsors of the affair.

SHE POINTED out that it is a common error among parents to want to be popular with their children at all costs. If parents realize their vocation is to train children in the fundamental truths of life, "We would not over-indulge them."

"We would see that they need discipline, for as an adult, they will need to have mastered self-discipline."
