

Helicopters:

Ambulances Of The Future

Margaret Foley, executive secretary, Conference of Catholic Schools of Nursing, St. Louis, Missouri, was in Rochester this week to participate in the biennial convention of the New York State League for Nursing. She spoke on Tuesday afternoon at the Powers Hotel on a panel, "Nursing Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow."

Miss Foley said three explanations are having their effect: the explosion of knowledge, leisure time and population, and that nursing care in the future must be geared to meet the needs created by these circumstances. SHE PREDICTED that automatic technology and electronic systems will change nursing practices.

She suggested that in the year 1988 helicopters may serve as ambulances, controlled temperature in hospitals will eliminate the need for blankets, movable walls will facilitate environmental change.

"Anti-tox waves" will remove dust and organisms to control disease spread, patients will be transported from one department to another without discomfort or moribund, and radiation plus mutation of fruits and vegetables during growth will "tailor" foods to meet specific needs of the human body.

Miss Foley was honored at a tea at Nazareth College on Wednesday, given by the Sisters of Saint Joseph for all the representatives of Catholic schools of nursing attending the convention.

CHOSEN PRESIDENT of the Junior Red Cross of New York City, she was its representative to the International Study Center in Taunton, while still in high school and she also attended the Red Cross convention in Los Angeles.

Molly was chosen to represent her school and the City of New York as one of a group of six to go to the State of Israel as a guest of the Israeli government, to observe the way of life in the "Cradle of Christendom."

A scholarship student at Bellevue, Molly won further honors here.

She was vice president of her freshman class; president of her class in second term; secretary of the Bellevue Student Association and was recently chosen president of the entire student body.

It's easy to understand why Molly chose Bellevue, her mother is an alumnae of the institution. Her father, Arthur Cronemeyer, is a brewer-salesman and she has a younger brother and sister, both whom are in high school.

After graduating from Bellevue next summer, Molly intends to go to college to get her BS degree, "but I haven't quite made up my mind where to go."

Bishop Casey Opens Avon Fund Drive

Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence B. Casey will address the campaign workers at the opening of the \$100,000 fund raising drive for the new convent for St. Agnes Parish, Avon, at 6:30 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 25.

The drive, under the honorary chairmanship of Monsignor Patrick J. Flynn, parish administrator, and general chairmanship of Charles Connor, will start Sunday, Oct. 26, with a canvass by workers of the entire parish.

Msgr. Flynn also plans to make major renovations in the church with the funds raised. Foley Associates of Rochester are assisting on the fund drive.
