## Schools Can't Be Neutral

Stamford — (NC) — It is not possible for a school to maintain an attitude of neutrality toward religion, the Apostolic Delegate to the United States asserted here at the dedication of Stamford Catholic High School.

Cicognani as he dedicated the multimillion dollar school that will accommodate about 1,200 students.

Cicognani stressed the importance of a God-centered school. "It is wrong," he said, "to think that it is enough for the school to provide for subjects of knowledge and learning and maintain an attitude of neutrality toward religion. Such neutrality is not possible."

"Moral principles and fundamental truths upon which the life of man, his origin and ultimate destiny are based are constantly recurring," the Apostolic Delegate continued. "They come up in every phase and circumstance of life and in a particular way in the school. Such a neutrality is not possible, for those principles are either affirmed or denied. . . . Either the dignity of man, his rights and duties are mentioned, or questions are touched upon which concern philosophy, the science of truth, that truth which is the origin of all knowledge."

"In the life of each student, God stands at the center," the Archbishop stated, "and thus He must be considered especially in the school. There is no doubt that the child by nature is directed toward God. He soon gives proof that the natural is not enough, and he himself comes to see that the natural by itself would make life unnatural. It would be sad indeed if the education which he receives in school resulted in separating him from God."

"There can be no separation from the Lord, our Creator and our Eternal Reward," Archbishop Cicognani declared. "All educators must ever keep this before their minds."

### Mercy Students Rosaries Touched To Pope Pius XII

Two students of Mercy High School are proud owners of rosaries uniquely blessed by being touched to the late Pope Pius XII moments before his burial.

Bluejean Delaura and Marilyn Waddell, both juniors, last week sent two rosaries to Cardinal Tisserant, Dean of the College of Cardinals, as big that they touched to the body of the Holy Father.

This week Tuesday the girls received a personally addressed and signed note from the 42-year Gabriel Prince of the Chateau returning the rosaries and telling the students: "Your rosaries were brought in contact with the right cheek of the Pope just before the burial ceremony began."

Cardinal Tisserant said he received the request a mere two hours before the rite was scheduled to start. He urged the girls to "pray well" with the blessed rosaries and asked especially for prayers for the Cardinals who will enter the Conclave on Saturday.

### Priest Doffs Clericals To Visit Red Germany

New Orleans — (NC) — After half a century of black suits and Roman collars, Jesuit Father Karl A. Maring discarded them in favor of a sport jacket, slacks and sport shirt. But there was good reason for the change, he explained here.

It happened during the past summer when the Loyola University of the South seismologist visited his native Germany. He wanted to see how the other half lived, so he made the clothing change and went from western Berlin to eastern Berlin.

"I knew the communists would arrest me, a priest, if they found me out," Father Maring said. "I passed guards several times but they didn't suspect anything. They just waved me on. I spoke only German."

Europe to attend a meeting of the World Federation of Catholic Universities in Berlin, he said he visited Germany to find out how much his homeland had changed since he left it in 1924.

### Pope John UNESCO Observer In Paris

Paris — (NC) — His Holiness Pope John XXIII served for about 19 months as the Holy See's permanent observer to UNESCO here and said Catholics can draw inspiration from the international organization's work.

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization was formed in 1945 when the new Pontiff was serving as Apostolic Nuncio to France.

Until June, 1952, he served as a delegate-observer at UNESCO's sessions. In that year, he was appointed by the Holy See as its first permanent observer. He held this post until January, 1953, when he was elevated to the Sacred College of Cardinals and named Patriarch of Venice.

### Keep Kids In School Longer

Independence, Iowa — (NC) — Lengthening of both the school day and the school year to provide a better Catholic education was advocated here by Father James Curtin, superintendent of schools in the St. Louis archdiocese.

He told a teachers' institute of 1,400 Sisters and lay teachers from northeastern Iowa that "we are under universal, compulsory education because of canon law and theological principle."

Despite increases of 100 to 150 per cent in Catholic school facilities during the last decade, Father Curtin said that the facilities now must be doubled within the next ten years to meet increasing enrollments.

**Another Unsung Hero**  
Among the unsung heroes of this world are those who quietly accept and carry out an unpopular task because it is their duty. Such a man is Colonel Arthur Levitt, member of the Board of Education, who was assigned by the trustees to be the trial judge at the latest trial of New York City teachers who refused to tell the Superintendent of Schools whether they are or have been members of the Communist party. Anyone reading the briefs commending their dismissal would know that recommending efforts to get at the truth is a painful, painstaking task. For all his efforts to persuade and to see justice done, for all his sacrifice in enduring the grueling days of the trial, for all his efforts to persuade these teachers not to destroy themselves by their silence, he had, on Thursday of last week, to sit through an hour and a half of testimony from six of them, from two of whom he had previously given the benefit of the doubt. Colonel Levitt, Jr., who is due to leave the United States Air Force, said quietly behind his father and listened to the abuse heaped upon his sensitive, unassuming and respected parent by those who would not or could not disclaim loyalty to Communism, an enemy which he is preparing to fight.
