ceremonies of the 262nd suc-  
cessor to St. Peter in Rome. The  
highly respected Eugenio Cardi-  
nal Pacelli was wearing of the  
Fischgraben's Ring receiving the  
triple crown. He had the good  
will and prayers of all Chris-  
tians, each of those outside  
that realm.

Mar. 12, 1939 (local papers only).  
On page 10, section D, un-  
der "Births Today," in pic-  
smallest type: "Daly, John and  
Mary; girl."

priest friend, recently returned
