

# Parish Drive Goes Over Top

Faithfuls of St. Gregory's Church, Marlon, faced with an immediate need to replace the church organ, oversubscribed a fund raising drive to purchase the organ, it was revealed today.

THE FUND DRIVE committee, headed by Edmond DeWind and Mrs. Katherine Nevil, sought \$1,500. In the drive held Sunday, workers on the drive received \$1,301.75 in cash, and received pledges for an additional \$457.25.

# Cardinals Generosity Aid Japanese Lepers

Kyokuka, Japan — (NC) — There were almost as many Cardinals here as there were in Rome for the conclave, but their purpose was quite different.

The "Cardinals" in Kyokuka were all laymen, members of the St. Louis Cardinals base ball team now on a business morning tour of Japan.

The National League squad was met by Bishop Dominic Tusznet of Kyokuka, who thanked the Cardinals for a favor eight years ago.

It was in 1950 that Bishop Tusznet had written the Society to Aid the Missions in Cincinnati, to help the Blawassaki Leprosarium near here.

Father Barnabas Shimura, who had been ministering to the victims of Hansen's disease for 20 years, had himself contracted the disease, the Bishop wrote.

The priest had reported many deaths among young victims, and told of the need of some form of recreation to lift the boys' morale. He said he had once seen a St. Louis Cardinal uniform, and asked for a Cardinal emblem for his players.

# Jesuit To Make Trek Across Antarctic Ice

Cincinnati — (NC) — Father Edward A. Bradley, S.J., Xavier University physics professor participating in the Navy's Operation Deep Freeze in Antarctica, will soon begin a 1,000-mile exploratory trek across the western half of the frozen continent.

Father Paul L. O'Connor, S.J., Xavier president, learned this in a conversation with him via telephone-short wave radio.

Father Bradley said the temperature at Ellsworth Station was 50 degrees below zero, that his health was excellent.

but that he was getting just a bit weary after a four-month period of enforced idleness.

The Jesuit priest has been "hibernating" at the Ellsworth Station on the Weddell Sea coast during the Antarctic total-darkness winter which corresponds roughly to the summer in this part of the world.

The sun comes up in Antarctica around October 7, and, barring unfavorable weather conditions, the priest-scientist then will begin the last phase of his mission there.

Chief seismologist with the Naval party at Ellsworth Station, Father Bradley has been employing seismographic equipment to determine icecap thickness.

# Monsignor Toomey Dies; Syracuse Charities Head

Rt. Rev. Monsignor Joseph B. Toomey, 54, president-elect of the Catholic Hospital Association of the United States and Canada and a graduate of St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, died suddenly Monday, Nov. 10, in Syracuse.

Msgr. Toomey, director of Catholic Charities for the Diocese of Syracuse, was found dead by an assistant pastor of St. John the Evangelist Church, in the church rectory. Msgr. Toomey was pastor of the Syracuse church.

FORMER NATIONAL spiritual director of the National Council of Catholic Nurses, Msgr. Toomey spoke at a dinner of the Rochester Council of Catholic Nurses which honored Bishop Kearney in 1951.

The Syracuse Charities director gave the opening address of the Rochester Community Chest Campaign in the Chamber of Commerce in May, 1956.

He was also former president of the National Conference of Catholic Charities, and former president of the New York State Conference on Social Work.

New York Governor Averill Harriman on hearing of Msgr. Toomey's death sent a message which stated that the late prelate "was, of course, first of all, a servant of God, but in a multitude of ways, most of these too little known now, he was a de-

voted servant of the people of New York State.

A native of Binghamton, Msgr. Toomey received his bachelor's degree from the University of Notre Dame and was ordained to the priesthood in 1930 after completing his theological studies at St. Bernard's Seminary. He was advanced to the rank of domestic prelate by Pope Pius XII in 1950.

# Nuns 'Deal' Pays Off, Prayers Win Convent

Hannover — (RNS) — The Order of the Poor Clares, a strictly cloistered congregation of nuns, will soon have its first convent in Northern Germany, thanks to a "deal" made several years ago with a Belgian priest.

CONSTRUCTION of the convent is nearing completion in a Hannover suburb and dedication ceremonies are scheduled for this fall.

Father Werenfried van Straaten of Antwerp, Belgium, founder of the Dutch-Belgian Aid for Eastern Europe organization, promised nuns of the order in Dusseldorf that he would help build the convent if they would give prayer assistance to his plans to establish a Building Order as an auxiliary group of the Aid.

Now, with the Building Order established, as an organization of young people who help erect homes and churches for Catholic refugees in Western Europe, Father van Straaten is fulfilling his earlier promise.

### Communist Festival

Vienna — (RNS) — Officials of the Austrian Catholic Youth Associations issued a strong protest here against plans for holding a Communist-sponsored world youth festival in Vienna next year.

# Fr. Dulles Gives First Sermon

Rome — (RNS) — A call for Christian unity was sounded here by Father Avery F. Dulles, S.J., son of U.S. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, in his first sermon as a Jesuit preacher.

In his sermon, delivered in the eighteenth-century church of San Silvestro in Capite, Father Dulles quoted from the homily given by Pope John XXIII at his coronation in which he said: "We open our heart and arms to all those who are separated" from the Roman Catholic Church.

A convert himself, Father Dulles was received into the Church in 1948 and was ordained by Cardinal Spellman in June, 1956. He is in Rome studying for a doctorate in theology.
