Baby-Sitting

Last Sunday morning I spent a very pleasant, albeit lively, forty-five minutes as a sort of a dult adviser on a baby sitting project.



The two leaders are always present with them, but on last Saturday, Mrs. Raymond Conley who had been called out of the city, telephoned me to ask me to take her place on Sunday.

The girls had offered to have the baby sitting project for the 8 and 9 o'clock Masses, but they had discovered after several weeks that the 8 o'clock Mass was not favored by parents of young children. Recalling all the preparations that have to be made to take a small child out, no parent is surprised that 8 o'clock is a little early to be ready for Mass.

WE ARRIVED after having attended the 8 o'clock Mass, and already parents and babies and small children were arriving. By the time the last child had been handed over to us, we had twenty-seven youngsters all under four years of age in our care.

Several things impressed me as I was there. One was the arranging a amount of good will that the project represented. First of all, I paid a silent tribute to the kindergarten Sister and the Pastor who so willingly handed over their domain to the younger set.

When the last child left, the place looked like a tornado had swept through, but after a few minutes activity on the part of the Girl Scouts, the room had been restored to its pristine neatness. Notice I did not say order, as we were told simply to return things to the shelves, that the kindergarten on Monday morning take genuine pleasure in restoring order after their Sunday visitors.
