'Smut Cleanup' People's Job

Cleanup through public opinion — this is how the Catholic Church wants to bring decent movies into neighborhood theaters and remove dirty magazines from newsstands, a Jesuit priest said in Rochester Saturday.

Speaking before the Rochester City Club in the Chamber of Commerce, Rev. Harold C. Gardiner, S.J., literary editor of the national Catholic weekly, said that the Church does not want to bring the matter of indecent books and indecent motion pictures before the courts.

"THE CATHOLIC Church does not want to go to court on smut matters," he said. "We want the public to decide this problem by getting them to ask newsstand proprietors to remove indecent literature from their stands and getting the neighborhood movie houses from showing films that are not good for the entire family."
