Advent Daily Mass, Communion Asked

Bishop Kearney has designated 1959 to be a "Eucharistic Year" throughout the twelve county Diocese of Rochester.

It is to be "a year of special devotion to the Redeemer of the world, present in the Holy Sacrament of the Altar."

The Bishop, in a letter to be read at Masses in all parish churches of the Diocese this Sunday, asks the faithful to observe Advent, the four weeks before Christmas, as "a special time of prayer" to prepare for the year-long devotion honoring our Lord Jesus Christ in the Blessed Sacrament.

World-wide observance of 1958 as a Marian Year and 1959 as the Lourdes Centenary Year resulted in marked increase of devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Bishop says.

"It is most fitting, now, that we turn our hearts and lips to the special honor of the Eucharistic King," the Bishop says in his letter.

He especially urges the faithful to attend daily Mass and receive Holy Communion during Advent to bring "God's special blessing upon our mortal visitors to make 1959 a great and worthy Eucharistic Year."

"These weeks of Advent, especially by the Church and period of welcome welcome for the Infant of Bethlehem, will serve this year as a special preparation for our Eucharistic Year 1959," the Bishop's letter states.

Recent Vatican decrees allowing evening Mass and ending the ancient fast laws of Holy Communion have "brought Mass and Communion so much nearer to all of us," writes the Bishop, "that it is possible for most of us to go to Mass daily and to receive the precious body of Our Lord and Saviour."

He said "noon Masses and evening Masses daily" are a privilege not enjoyed by our predecessors.

Details of the year-long program will be announced as soon as plans for special diocesan-wide or local parish events of the Eucharistic Year are completed.

The Bishop said his "hopes and plans" for the Eucharistic Year include lectures, sermons and ceremonies which will increase understanding and devotion for the sacrifice of the Mass and the sacrament of Holy Communion.

Also to be included is a study of the just published instruction from Rome calling for the people to participate more actively at Mass.

Kremlin To Admit Priest To Moscow

Washington (C.N.) — The Soviet Union has cleared the way for an American priest to bring help to the needs of American Catholics in Moscow after a delay of more than three years.

Father Louis A. Dion, A.A., of Assumption College, Worcester, Mass., is expected to go to the Soviet capital to replace Father Georges Bissot, D.A.V., who was suddenly expelled without explanation in March 1955.

THE NEW SOVIET move also came swiftly. Father Dion was expected to apply for his visa as soon as possible. A letter of application to Assumption College in last fall to make provisions for someone to take over his duties there.

The State Department disclosed that the Soviet Union's willingness to accept a Moscow chaplain for American Catholics was made known in a communication to the U.S. Embassy in the Red capital.

Department spokesman Edward White told his news conference of the Soviet willingness to accept a chaplain. He said that "we were quite satisfied that the Soviet government appears ready to fulfill its responsibilities under the Roosevelt-Latin American agreement."

This agreement, reached in 1933 between President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Soviet Foreign Minister Maxim Litvinov, pledged that an American clergyman would be allowed to reside in Moscow for the benefit of American citizens there. It has no specific date.

Kremlin Prelate Visits America

New York (C.N.) — Archbishop Boris (Yakovlevich) Exarch for North America and the Alaskan Islands of the Moscow Patriarchate of the Russian Orthodox Church arrived here for a three-months visit.

He will spend the time visiting parishes belonging to the Patriarchal Russian Orthodox Church in North America, which is under the jurisdiction of the Moscow Patriarchate.

Pope Takes Possession Of His Cathedral

Rome — (RNS) — Pope John XXIII blessed the thousands of faithful who lined San Giovanni Square here as he was carried on his portable throne to take formal possession of the Basilica of St. John Lateran. The oldest church in this city, it is the Pontiff's cathedral in his capacity as Bishop of Rome. St. Peter's is a basilica.

Meanwhile, Wednesday morning, Cardinal Konrad Adenauer also commented on the Berlin crisis in an address in Munich to an audience of Catholic priests and Protestant ministers.

He warned that the Soviets "will enslave the two and a half million people of Berlin like the 18 million Germans of the Soviet zone."

If the Reds were to accomplish this Chancellor Adenauer said, it would be "a shock for the whole of Europe."

He emphasized that only the cooperation of the free world can avert catastrophe and that Germany relies on the promises of the Western powers regarding the safety of Berlin.

The idea for the institution was originated by a Brooklyn girl, Catherine FitzGibbons, during three days when she lay in a casket given up for dead, in 1849.

New York at the time was in the grip of an Asiatic cholera epidemic. People were dying by the thousands.

Miss FitzGibbons became a victim of the disease and fell into a death-like trance. A doctor pronounced her dead. She lay helpless, unable to speak, in the casket for three days and even overheard details of her burial being discussed.

Later she told of having a dream, while in the coffin, of groups of children reaching out their arms for protection. She vowed if she were saved from being buried alive, she would devote her life to caring for orphans. As the undertaker was about to close the casket, he noted a flicker of her eyelids.

The following year in keeping with her vow, she joined the Sisters of Charity and became known as Sister Mary Irene. In 1869 with only a \$5 bill she rented a small house which became the first New York Foundling Hospital.



Youngest and Oldest Cardinals



My dear People:
