North Pole News Report:

Temperature Low; Morale High

North Pole — Rev. Lawrence E. Ward, a Rochester Diocese priest serving with the Air Force at the northernmost post of the U.S. armed forces here, reports that morale among the troops is very high, in spite of the constant below zero temperatures.

Father Ward, now First Lt. Lawrence E. Ward, is a former assistant pastor at Corpus Christi Church, Rochester, St. John the Evangelist Church, Spencerport and St. Francis De Sales Church, Warren. He was appointed an Air Force Chaplain in June, 1957.

IN A LETTER to Rev. Henry Atwell, editor of the Catholic Courier Journal, Father Ward said that he was among the priests and men who greeted Father Thomas Cunningham, S.J., the polar scientist who landed in his camp after his dramatic rescue with the rest of the 177 team from a disintegrating ice flow this month.

"The temperature has been in the minus 10's and 15's since I arrived here on Nov. 4. There has been precious little daylight. What we have now is twilight for two or three hours a day.

"At the end of November, the long winter night of 24 hours will hold all in icy darkness. This darkness will extend through Jan. 21, after which we will get total daylight.

"The food is excellent here," he said. "It's high in protein because of the low temperatures. Although everyone looks forward to getting home after putting in

Belgium Bishops Protest 'Mobile' Work Week Plan

Brussels — (RNS) — A growing practice among industrial and business firms in this country to give employees a week off after they have worked five consecutive Sunday days was attacked by the Belgian Catholic hierarchy in a pastoral letter issued here.

EMPLOYERS who participate in the new system, called the "mobile week," stress only the material benefits to themselves and their workers, the bishops said. Increased production and higher wages, they added, do not compensate for the loss of "Sunday rest."

Missionary At Hemlock Seminary

Rev. Anthony J. Krajci, S.V.D., veteran Divine Word missionary from New Guinea arrived at St. Michael's Mission Seminary, Conesus, to deliver a movie in which Father Krajci himself was the main actor.

The mission movie dealt with the work of the Divine Word Fathers and Brothers in the New Guinea Missions of the Society.

As director of education in the Wevok Vicariate, Father Krajci is a key figure in the extensive educational program carried on there by the Catholic Church which conducts 421 schools with an enrollment of 12,150.

Among the first missionaries to arrive in New Guinea after World War II, he was first stationed in the Aitape area where mission work, begun in 1896, had been interrupted by two world wars. During World War II some of the bitterest fighting in the New Guinea campaign took place in the Aitape area on mission property.

IN THE WAKE of Japanese and allied attacks up and down the New Guinea coast, 113 Divine Word missionaries and Holy Ghost missionary Sisters lost their lives. Father Krajci was one of the replacements for the mission personnel. His first task was founding a mission station deep in the interior.

Currently, Father Krajci is giving illustrated lectures on New Guinea to interested groups. He will return to New Guinea in January.

In addition to Divine Word priests and brothers in the area, the vicariate's personnel includes Holy Ghost missionary Sisters from Tochny, Ill. Mercy Sisters from Australia, native New Guinea nuns, lay missionaries and native teachers and catechists.

Missioner Warns On Reds Increase

Baltimore — (NC) — A warning of the increasing strength and influence of the Communist party in South America was sounded here by a missionary priest.

"The recent visit of Vice President Nixon was a blessing in many ways," said Father Lawrence Schanberger, M.M., son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Schanberger, of this city. "It gave the American people a look at what the situation is. Everyone does not love us—and the communists are not idle."

Six years in Chile as head of a large agricultural school for boys in the Molina area has produced in the Maryknoll missionary admiration for the Chilean people as well as fear that communism may strike a fatal blow.

"There are only the rich and the poor," he said. "There is no middle class, to speak of." And for the poor, he explained, there is little hope of getting rich.

Communism has made its strongest appeal to the poor of Chile, he said. But few people realize to what extent that influence has been felt until the recent election—a battle the legalized Communist party nearly won.

When the ballots were counted the communist candidate missed being elected to the presidency by only 20,000 votes. It was an
