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## DOINGS AT THE DALY'S

This column is an apology. It's a typical example of human nature's tendency to say "Please" and "Thank you" or at least the following:

"Mea culpa, mea culpa, mea maxima culpa."

During the past summer — the summer of 1938 which we shall never forget our attention was pivoted principally on the spinal operation of our daughter Mary.

We hoped that we had thanked you, the readers of this column, for your prayers. However, from your letters of inquiry, we note that we have failed to tell you that those generous prayers were answered a thousandfold.

Humblly grateful, we report: Mary is fine in medical terms. The report might be "The patient is progressing splendidly and, barring complications, no foreshadowing of this time, should show a normal rate of recovery."

In our language: Mary is O.K.

THERE HAS BEEN, of course, a rather long convalescence from body cast, to short cast, to the somewhat complicated back brace she must wear for the next few months. However, Mary is now back in school — a sophomore in college. Keeping up with her work, but tiring very easily.

We can tell when she's tired — by the whiteness around the mouth, the faint blue shadows under her eyes, but she pretends not to notice. On an end play the game with Mary. It's hard, when you're young, not to be able to keep up with the progression, but an intense will to do can help.

Since everybody in school has to take "fiz" in some form, she sits in, does gym and, she says, on the bench keeping score. "Well," she laughs, "they also save the requirements of the physical education course who only sit and wait it out!"

One reason for the fitness is that muscle tone was quite naturally impaired by the long incarceration. "Method" was the skillful orthopedic nurse, Miss Mary P. Billmeyer, puts it.

Thanks to the unskilled know-how of Miss Billmeyer, those muscles are now being restored. A series of short self-helps demonstrated by this expert have put the other Mary on her feet in more ways than one. First there was the lifting of the right leg, second — it wouldn't hold then the left.

After a while when each would ho-o-oid, there was the lifting of the leg with a pound of sugar.

On each — then an increase in weights.

"It's up to you, Mary," Miss Billmeyer told her. "Nobody can strengthen those muscles now but you. And to do it right those muscles must get 'tired'."

Now, the five-pound sugar bags are more easily manipulated day by day. ("I guess you'd say peddled, wouldn't you?")

At any rate, Mary is doing just fine.

LUCKILY, the styles this year favor one who must wear a spinal brace for, with the 1938 fashionable back drapery, the steel-and-straps contraption is scarcely noticeable.

Except now and then, such as the shorker received from a classmate: "I hadn't noticed that you were hump-backed until just now."

Remarks like this, the veiled staring, the "wonder-what's-the-matter-with-her" revealed by quickly averted eyes — these all have made Mary conscious of the value of tact and kindness and true charity.

This has been an experience for Mary physically and emotionally that has tested not only her bones and muscles but her faith and fortitude. Her situation was indeed a trying one, but one that has led to a highly maturing effort.

### Private Property Gone In China

Exiled Missioner Tells Heart-Break Story

Milwaukee — (NC) — A fourth of the human race lost title to any property it could call its own when China's population was organized into large communes this fall, a Jesuit missionary said.

Father Charles McCarthy, S.J., former prisoner of the Chinese communists, spoke here of changes in mainland China so far-reaching that "thoughtful Catholic laity with warm, honest hearts should pause and look at them a little longer."

The huge segment of humanity in China may forget there is another human way of life, because of the brutal force used to organize communes, extreme forms of Soviet collectivization in which thought, economic or familial, is left to the privacy of the individual.

Loss of property has been accompanied by loss of family life long cherished by the Chinese people. Father McCarthy reported, and the story behind the loss is one of terrorism, evolutions and arrests.

The Jesuit Father, who sent news reports from Peking and other Catholic prisoners in China Shanghai from 1947 to 1949 for would want you to do for them... the N.C.W.C. News Service, estimated that there were at least 2,500,000 evictions in six years, and high school populations, for example, conducted by the Catholic School between 1938, when the Communist Party Association and the Communists took over, and 1955. More than 11 million persons dispossessed.

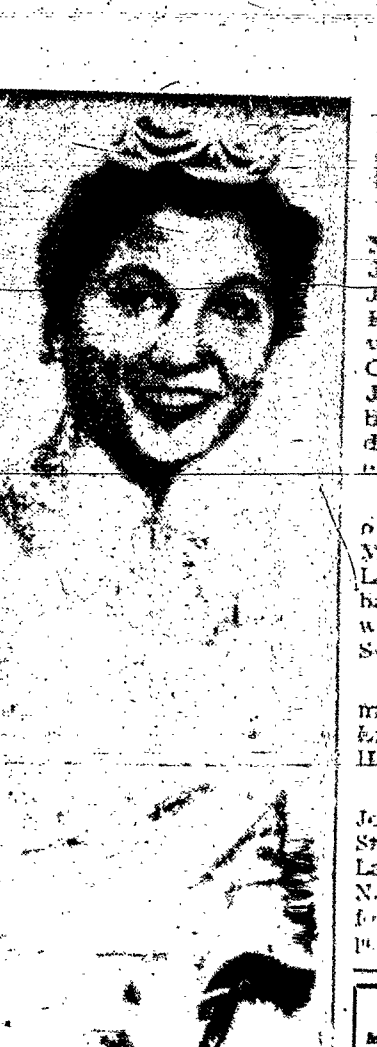
