Mayor James D. O'Brien of Worcester commission chairman, said that "it is for the best interests of the industry that its advertisements should in no way associate the children's saint with alcoholic beverages."

### Bishop McNulty Sees Increased Support For Legion Of Decency

Paterson (NC)—A prediction that the National Legion of Decency's new classification for "adults only" will earn the organization increased support from Catholic educators was made here.

Bishop James A. McNulty of Paterson, N.J., new chairman of the U.S. Bishops' Committee for Motion Pictures, Radio and Television, said the legion's experience in the past years "warrants an optimistic outlook for future support of its objectives by this large and influential section of the Catholic community."

ANNUALLY since 1938, the legion pledge is read at all Masses in U.S. churches in December and congregations are requested to indicate agreement with it.

Bishop McNulty spoke of the legion's A-3 classification, "morally objectionable for adults." It was established 10 months ago and is the latest addition to the legion's other classifications: A-1, morally objectionable for general patronage; A-2, morally unobjectionable for adults and ad-

olescents; B, morally objectionable for all, and C, condemned.

The new triple A rating grew out of the legion's recognition of the swing-by the movie industry toward subject matter aimed especially at adults, he said. The industry's move was made, in part, to bring back the film world's traditional "lost audience," those over 30 years of age.

EMPHASIZING that films in A-3 are intended for adults exclusively and that parents should bear this in mind, Bishop McNulty said the new classification was "enthusiastically" welcomed by professional Catholic education circles and has earned the "deep interest" of the motion picture industry.

The prelate stated that "specific mention should be made of the frequent favorable comment on the classification heard at the convention of the Catholic Theological Society of America; at the convention of the International Federation of Catholic Alumnae; and at the international meeting of the International Catholic Film Office, Paris."

### Diamonds For Madonna

Brooklyn (RNS)—Msgr. Angelo R. Cioffi, pastor of St. Rosalia's Regina Pacis Votive Shrine displays the 12 diamond-studded stars which were affixed to the sanctuary's mural of the Blessed Mother and Infant. Thanksgiving gifts of the halo, in addition to a diamond brooch and ring, were made in gratitude to the Blessed Virgin for the prompt return of two solid gold crowns which were stolen from the mural in 1952, one week after they had been contributed by some 12,000 parishioners. The crowns were returned a week later. The diamonds, insured for \$100,000, had been blessed in the Vatican by the late Pope Pius XII.

### Cancelled Stamps

In one of her poems Emily Dickinson compares a book to a fugate and points out that a book can bring great riches to its reader as a cargo ship brings great wealth into the harbor.

I often think that such a simple thing might be applied to the mail which is delivered daily at our doors. I refer not only to the excellent published articles in the various magazines and papers, but also to the inspiration and ideas which I frequently find in correspondence.

One such idea came recently from a woman who had written me about a Courier column. She concluded by telling me that commemorative stamps are of special value to the missions. She quoted a missionary friend as saying that commemorative stamps were worth ten dollars a thousand to the missions.

I used to be very faithful about collecting every used stamp I could lay my hands on and then sending it off to the Josephite Fathers in Maryland. I don't remember even what caused me to save for the Josephites because practically every religious group will accept the stamps. I have requests from many others.

Our children used to "save the stamps for Sister." They used to take them to school to their teachers. Perhaps that is how I bowed out of the picture. I let the children save them and they lost enthusiasm when I did not keep up my interest.

I recall how one of my relatives used to save the stamps received on the letters at the school age are invited.
