Epilepsy Is Controllable

Geneva — "A great number of epileptics lead useful ordinary lives and many have superior intelligence," Rev. John Murphy, a native Genevan who is Catholic chaplain of Craig Colony, Sonyea, reported.

"EPILEPSY IS a controllable condition and treatment is most effective when tension and anxiety are eliminated," Father Murphy told the Geneva unit, Catholic Nurses, at their annual Christmas dinner party in Sacone's restaurant.

Craig Colony is a state hospital and school for the care of epileptics.

Epilepsy, he said, is a disorder affecting the nerve cells of the brain.

GRAND-MAL IS one type of epilepsy. In this type, the seizure may rise from the depths of the brain. The epileptic cry, a sharp birdlike sound, frequently heralds the arrival of a seizure. Then comes the seizure itself which may last five to 15 minutes.

In the Jacksonian seizure the convulsion is confined to one side of the body. In the Petit Mal, epileptic seizures are less severe and last for seconds only. The patient has a typical black-out stare.

Psychomotor epilepsy is characterized by purposeful behaviour which is not appropriate to the circumstances in which the patient finds himself. As in all forms of the disease the patient has total amnesia for his attack.

FATHER MURPHY said attacks have been traced to head injuries, birth injuries, brain infections, brain tumors, and the defects in cerebral circulation. Such conditions may affect a small region of the brain producing scar tissue or a center of epileptic discharges.

Treatment involves elimination of causative and precipitating factors which may call for special surgery, medical therapy using anti-convulsive drugs, and psychological and social adjustment.
