Instead, the vendors will say, "Get your tunies while they're hot."

AND, YOU CAN get your bottom dollar that they'll sell like hotcakes — if last Friday at Nazareth Academy is any criterion.

The Breast-O'-Chicken Tuna Fish Company, now introducing its new product, "Tunies", to the East Coast — asked the students at the Lake Avenue Academy to sample the "Tunies" that day.

"Tunies" look like, taste like and smell like regular hot dogs — but they don't contain meat in any way, shape or form. They're made of tuna fish with spices and seasoning added.

ALL TOLD, 350 of this God-send product made for people who don't like fish were served Friday.

After the experiment, the students were asked their opinion, with the following result:

"Tunies" are an invention of William Lane and Curt Schimler of California.

AFTER WORLD War Two, he and Schimler got together and after four years solved the problems that confronted them — mainly to eliminate the smell of fish and started to manufacture.

After being introduced on the West Coast, "Tunies" became an overwhelming favorite and this year the Breast-O'-Chicken Company, began a promotion program to make "Tunies" a nationwide seller.
