## GOD LOVE YOU!

FEW REALLY UNDERSTAND that God does not work the way the world works. In fact St. Paul tells us that the wisdom of the world is foolishness with God.

CONSIDER THIS CASE of the poor widow of Sarepta, the little village between Tyre and Sidon, who was visited by the prophet Elias. The poor starving widow and her emaciated son were told by Elias to have faith in God.

SHE HAD A SMALL earthen pot in which there were a few drops of oil. Elias made a sign over it, but when she looked into the jug there was no more oil than before. But as she poured out the oil she needed she discovered that the level of oil remained apparently as it had been. The need of the moment was supplied, but no more. God gave manna to the Jews in the desert sufficient for each day, but never enough to store. In like manner was the oil given to the widow. The increase was in proportion to the decrease; not only the widow's oil but her son also grew in consuming. Not getting, not saving, but giving is the way to abundance.

OUR LORD SAID "Give and it will be given to you." We know one missionary in a poor parish in the frozen north who had \$700 but needed ten times that amount to build a school and a church. He gave the \$700 to the poor and within a week received an anonymous gift of \$15,000. (Fifteen thousand dollars).

GOD NEVER ALLOWS us to feel that we are plentifully supplied; He does not want us to feel rich apart from Him. Only when we empty our selves does He fill the emptiness; only when we pour out the little we have, does He supply. With a faith and love give up the hope of security within yourselves; convert a pagan in India, heal a leper in Nigeria. Do this by the added act of faith of giving it to the Holy Father through his Society for the Propagation of the Faith and he will give you new blessings. Do not give little to get more; that is not fair, but greed. Give much to receive a blessing of a more precious kind.

## Near-Record Total Reported For Diocesan Clothing Drive

A near-record total of 333,583 pounds of clothing was collected by parishes in the Rochester Diocese in the annual Thanksgiving Clothing Collection drive held in November, according to Rev. E. Leo McMannis, diocesan director. The total was 21,899 pounds over the amount collected in 1957 and only 5,771 pounds short of the record 339,354 collected in 1956. Sacred Heart Cathedral parish contributed the most clothing with 572 cartons and 29,865 pounds. (See story on page 7.) Tabulation follows:
