

Fordham Announces New Multi-Million Seven Acre Campus

New York—(NO)—Fordham University's plans for a \$25,500,000 center at Lincoln Square were announced here by Father Laurence J. McGinley, S.J., president of the institution.

The university's center is part of New York City's urban renewal program in the Lincoln Square area.

Details of the university project were revealed by Father McGinley to a group of 15 alumni leaders, advisers and civic officials at an informal luncheon. Among those present were Mayor Robert W. Wagner, Commissioner Robert Moses, Manhattan Borough President Hulan Jack, and John D. Rockefeller III.

Fordham University's right to participate in the redevelopment project had been the subject of litigation for several months. State courts had ruled in favor of Fordham's participation and the U.S. Supreme Court had declined to accept jurisdiction in an appeal. In October, 1958, the Federal District Court in New York dismissed two cases involving the right of the university to take part in the project.

The redevelopment project is being carried out under the National Housing Act.

Father McGinley said that Fordham's new seven and a half-acre midtown campus will provide facilities for the university's downtown schools of law, business, social services, education and general studies.

In its initial stages it will handle an anticipated student population of 8,000, an increase of 50 per cent over the present enrollment of those schools. The site occupies two city blocks.

In outlining plans for the project, Father McGinley cited the future importance of the metropolitan university. He pointed to both the rapidly increasing population of metropolitan areas and the higher percentages of people pursuing higher education as critical factors.

In announcing the "rechristening," Father Raban Hathorn, O.S.B., the monthly's editor, noted that in recent years the magazine has focused exclusively on marriage and family living.

Soviet Youth Rites Enroll 80 Per Cent

Berlin — (RNS) — Over 80 per cent of eligible young people in the Soviet Zone of Germany have already enrolled for next spring's Communist youth dedication ceremonies there according to Neues Deutschland, official organ of the Socialist Unity (Communist) Party.

The rites, an atheistic counterpart of Christian Confirmation, have repeatedly been denounced by Protestant and Roman Catholic authorities.

Junge Welt (Young World) official organ of the Communist youth organization in East Germany, meanwhile has featured a contest for the best design of a "festive dress" to be worn by participants in the Communist youth rites.

Boston College Seeks New Name For Jubilee

East Providence — (RNS) — Boston College may have a new name before its 100th birthday in 1963, its president said here.

The Very Rev. Michael P. Walsh, S.J., told Rhode Island alumni of the college that there is considerable discussion on the campus of the Jesuit university in Boston, Mass., about the need for a new name.

TWO COMMITTEES are studying the question, he said, adding that the change is only in the study stage at present.

Father Walsh noted that the name could not be changed to "Boston University" because the city has a larger university (Methodist) with that name. "We feel that we are a university and always have been," Father Walsh said after the alumni meeting, dinner and dance here.

Painting Symbolizes Years' Devotion

(Continued from Page 1) philosophers, and the members of many religious orders.

Now what links these artists in heaven above with the medieval artist who painted below? Raphael himself gives us the answer in graphic terms. The link between heaven and earth is the Holy Ghost.

Hovering midway between the two worlds, through the medium of the four gospels (which the ribs hold open at either side of him), he sends down his rays to earth. The faithful on earth know what they are to believe. It has been revealed to them, and their teachers communicate it and explain it to them.

Nevertheless, they accept it not as something which they behold with their own eyes—as the saints in heaven behold God—but on faith. God himself has told them that it is true. They know that God cannot speak an untruth; hence they accept it all on his word.

Now for the Blessed Sacrament. We have not mentioned it so far; but the artist has made it the very center of the lower plane. Our eyes are drawn to it inescapably. It stands in a simple monstrance upon a very simple altar. What is its significance?

It seems quite certain that Raphael has meant to represent in this most generally the Eucharist itself, but all the divine mysteries which we accept on faith. Raphael's wonderful painting—by many considered his masterpiece—is therefore a symphony of line and color in honor of the Blessed Sacrament as a symbol of faith. It translates into pictorial design those familiar lines which St. Thomas wrote of the

faith in all his teachings. Just as we are prompted to acknowledge the presence of his "hidden divinity" under the appearance of the bread, so we are prompted to acknowledge all the rest he has revealed to us, because he has told us that it is all so.

Raphael's wonderful painting—by many considered his masterpiece—is therefore a symphony of line and color in honor of the Blessed Sacrament as a symbol of faith. It translates into pictorial design those familiar lines which St. Thomas wrote of the
