Notre Dame High Asks For \$30,000

Football or no football. This is the question that will be answered this Sunday when the final report is made on the current fund raising drive for Notre Dame High School.

THE SCHOOL is seeking \$30,000 from the people of Elmira and the Southern Tier area to field a football team.

"It's all up to the generosity of these people," Ed Rothwell, athletic director of Notre Dame, said.

Rothwell pointed out that several things can happen as a result of this drive.

"IF WE DON'T receive enough money, we won't be able to field any team," he said.

"If the people aren't able to contribute the full amount, we probably won't be able to field a team this year."

"But, if we get the amount we are asking, we will, in all likelihood, have a team this September."

ROTHWELL ALSO stated that he realized that this was a large amount asked for just one phase of athletic competition.

"However, the initial cost on anything is always the greatest," he said.

"Since we are starting from nothing, we need everything. We are planning to spend \$6,500 for uniforms and protective equipment; \$1,800 per year for medical supplies and insurance; \$600 each year for equipment replacement; \$1,500 for home game expenses; \$10,000 in coaching salaries for two years and \$6,000 for preparing playing and practice fields."

Rothwell said that \$10,000 would be kept in a reserve fund.

THE DRIVE got off to a good start at the kick-off dinner for 250 drive workers in the school cafeteria when a delegation from the Waverly-Sayre area presented a \$50 donation.

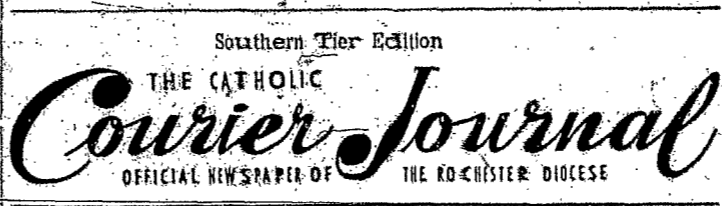
