# Basketball Tourney Slated

It's official!

The first in what is hoped to be an annual basketball tournament for Catholic high schools in the Diocese will be held at the beginning of March.

Rt. Rev. Monsignor Charles V. Boyle, Diocesan superintendent of schools, announced today that plans for the tournament had been completed after several months' preparation.

PLANS CALL FOR preliminary games to be played in Geneva and Elmira, and Rochester with the championship game also slated in Rochester.

Auxiliary Bishop Casey will climax the tournament with presentation of awards following the championship game which will be played Sunday, March 8 at the Rochester Institute of Technology gymnasium.

The tournament will include teams from Aquinas Institute and McQuaid Jesuit High School, Rochester; DeSales High School, Geneva; Mt. Carmel High School, Auburn; St. Anthony of Padua High School, Watkins Glen, and Notre Dame High School, Elmira.

REV. WILLIAM M. ROCHE, Diocesan associate superintendent of schools, said that the first games of the tournament will be played at Geneva, between DeSales and Mt. Carmel on March 3, and at Elmira, between Padua and Notre Dame, also on March 3.

The winners of these games will have a playoff on March 6, the location to be determined by the winners of the first games.

McQuaid and Aquinas will meet for the first time in their history on March 7 at the RIT gym.

THE CHAMPIONSHIP game will pit the winner between the two Rochester teams against the out-of-Rochester team.

General chairman of the tournament is Mark Tuohy Jr. He is aided by John Heveron, finance; Charles Miguet, tickets; John Norton, program; G. Thomas Walle, legal advisor and entertainment; Thomas Emmanuel, game officials; William J. Meyer Jr., house committee, and Howard Meath, coordinator of health, physical education and recreation.

Permission to conduct the tournament has been given by the state Catholic High School Athletic Association. Rev. John F. Bourke of Albany is chairman of this group.
