Seek \$1,500,000

Infirmiry Drive Plans Outlined

Plans are nearing completion in the four Elmira parishes staffed by the Sisters of St. Joseph participating in the current fund raising effort for the new infirmiry to be erected for sick and aged Sisters, adjacent to the Motherhouse at Pittsford.

THE COST OF the building will be \$1,500,000 and when completed, an entire floor at the Motherhouse will be released for training of novices in preparation for their future work in education and social service in the Diocese.

On Jan. 21, the first meeting was held at St. Casimir's school hall. Parish captains under the leadership of Arthur Keiffer outlined preliminary plans for their parish drive. Robert Erway and Charles Brady, co-chairmen of special gifts at St. Casimir's, also attended the meeting. A meeting of St. Casimir's special gifts committee was held on Jan. 28.

February 8 has been set as the parish solicitation date in all four parishes. Parishioners have been requested to remain at home during the afternoon and evening until the worker has made his visit.

ST. PETER AND Paul's committee is headed by Charles Bristow with captains and workers assigned to cover the parish.

The meeting to complete plans for the parish solicitation will be held in the school hall on Monday, Feb. 2.

St. Casimir's final meeting will be held on Tuesday, Feb. 3. Workers have been named to serve under their respective captains.

St. Mary's general chairman is Daniel J. Donahoe assisted by a large group of captains and workers. St. Mary's campaign leaders will meet with donors in St. Mary's auditorium on Wednesday, Feb. 4 to complete plans for parish solicitation. Fred A. Mulchay is special gifts chairman at St. Mary's.

AT ST. ANTHONY'S the campaign organization is under the chairmanship of Adolph Cirulli, who has listed captains and workers for parish solicitation. St. Anthony's meeting will be held on Thursday, Feb. 5 to complete plans.

Joseph Connor, representative of Foley Associates of Rochester, fund raising consultants for the Sisters' appeal, will speak at each of the meetings scheduled in Elmira.

First Time In Diocese Basketball Tournery Slated

It's official! The first in what is hoped to be an annual basketball tournament for Catholic high schools in the Diocese will be held at the beginning of March.

Rt. Rev. Monsignor Charles V. Boyle, Diocesan superintendent of schools, announced today that plans for the tournament had been completed after several months' preparation.

PLANS CALL FOR preliminary games to be played in Geneva and Elmira and Rochester with the championship game also slated in Rochester.

Auxiliary Bishop Casey will climax the tournament with presentation of awards following the championship game which will be played Sunday, March 8 at the Rochester Institute of Technology gymnasium.

The tournament will include teams from Aquinas Institute and St. Michael's High School, Rochester; DeSales High School, Geneva; Mt. Carmel High School, Auburn; St. Anthony of Padua High School, Watkins Glen, and Notre Dame High School, Elmira.

REV. WILLIAM M. Roche, Diocesan associate superintendent of schools, said that the first games of the tournament will be played at Geneva, between DeSales and Mt. Carmel on March 3, and at Elmira, between Padua and Notre Dame, also on March 3.

The winners of these games will have a playoff on March 6, the location to be determined by the winners of the first games.

McQuaid and Aquinas will meet for the first time in their history on March 7 at the RIT gym.

THE CHAMPIONSHIP game will pit the winner between the two Rochester teams against the out-of-Rochester team.

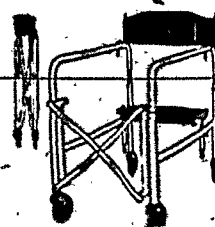
