



Step Toward Unity

One Bible Urged For All Churches

New York — (RNS) — A leading Roman Catholic Biblical scholar declared here that one of the most effective steps in the Christian unity movement in the English-speaking world would be the preparation of a unified Bible acceptable to both Protestants and Catholics.

Father Robert A. Dyson, S.J., professor of Sacred Scripture at Weston College, Weston, Mass., and formerly for 29 years professor of Biblical exegesis at the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome, made the suggestion at a luncheon in his honor attended by numerous Catholic and Protestant leaders.

The luncheon was arranged by Hawthorn Books, Inc., which recently published "The Catholic Bible in the St. Peter's Edition." Father Dyson was the chief annotator of the new illustrated Catholic family Bible, in which artists and scholars in the United States, England, Italy, Scotland, the Netherlands and Belgium also collaborated.

Three Years Enough For Pope

Vatican City — (RNS) — Pope John XXIII, at his customary mid-week general audience, said he wished to reign as long as Pope St. Agatha, during whose less than three-year pontificate the Sixth Ecumenical Council was convoked in 680, because "things must be done."

"Still," Pope John added, "Our Lord calls me this evening, I will be ready to answer His call."

The Pope, who recently announced he plans to summon another Ecumenical Council at a date not yet specified, apparently singled out Pope St. Agatha not only because the latter also called a General Council, but was well advanced in years when he was elected to the papal throne.

Pope John was elected to the papacy almost on the eve of his 77th birthday, but Pope St. Agatha was reputedly more than 100 when he was crowned.

the unity we have lost," he said that "if we are going to work for unity, one of the vital things is to have all Christian denominations using the same Bible."

He stressed that "a unified scholarly, scientific presentation of the Word of God would be the best humanly possible is entirely feasible."

Father Dyson said that only a comparatively few irreconcilable differences in Protestant and Catholic interpretations existed in either the Old or New Testament, and this difficulty could be obviated by Protestants publishing the corresponding Catholic texts in the footnotes, and vice versa.

He said he did not think "there is a single Protestant scholar who would not accept the idea of a unified Bible."

First Church Council In Year 325

Vatican City — (RNS) — The first of the 20 Ecumenical Councils in the history of the Catholic Church was held at Nicaea in the year 325. Summoned by Pope Sylvester I and lasting two months and twelve days, it condemned Arianism which denied the divinity of Christ, formulated the Nicene Creed still used at Mass and fixed a formula for dating Easter observances. Pope John XXIII's announcement of his intention to call an Ecumenical Council has been regarded as of epochal importance by religious leaders everywhere. It will be the first since the Vatican Council of 1869-70 at which the doctrine of papal infallibility was proclaimed.

Pope Announces Council Theme: 'Stop Quarreling'

Vatican City — (RNS) — Pope John XXIII told 185 parish priests of the Rome diocese in announcing plans for an Ecumenical Council he was well aware of the great difficulties opposing reunification of Churches "separated from Rome for so many centuries."

"But we shall tell them," he added, "to let us stop quarreling and get together."

The Pontiff drove from the Vatican to greet the priests at the headquarters of the Passionist Fathers, where they had gathered for a spiritual retreat.

Pope John stressed that the forthcoming General Council will not be concerned with instituting an historical process to ascertain "who is wrong and who is right," and "we won't say anything else than, 'Let us reunite, let us end discussions.'"

THE PONTIFF said he did not underestimate the difficulties of bringing about Christian unity, not only because the Churches "have been divided too long, but also because inside many Churches there have been internal quarrels due to differences of opinion."

He said it was evident, after these Churches had separated, that the Catholic Church had become more united and stronger than ever, which means "that the Catholic Church is in possession of the truth."

No announcement has been made as to when the Pope will convene the Ecumenical Council. Rumors in Vatican circles were that he will call a consistory in April or May officially to convene the Council, the first to be held since the Vatican Council of 1869-70.



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
