Hospitals Plead For More Nurses

tuberculosis nursing at Mt. Morris Tuberculosis Hospital for a four-week period.

THE PHILOSOPHY of the school presupposes a student with potential of intellect and will, who acquires knowledge through experimentation and study, learns through adequate repetition of activities in a controlled environment and develops personality traits, ideals and attitudes through experience.

The school of nursing aims to prepare nurses of sound judgment and character capable of functioning competently in planning, directing and administering comprehensive nursing care in institutions for care of the sick, in industries and in homes.

Sister Margaret Adelaide, administrator of St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira, pointed out that although there are more nurses active in the profession today than ever before in history, many more are needed to meet even the minimum health needs of the nation.

THE AMERICAN NURSES Association and the United States Public Health Service estimated that about 430,000 professional nurses were employed in January, 1936.

A recent study entitled "Nurses for a Growing Nation" projects the number of nurses who will be needed by 1970 to increase the ratio to 360 per 100,000 population to be 70,000.

While these figures point significantly to the need for school enrollment expansion in basic and advanced nursing education programs and sharpen personnel demands for teachers, supervisors and administrators in nursing education and nursing services, they indicate widespread opportunities for more young people to enjoy rewarding careers in nursing.

AND AS NURSING becomes increasingly diversified, it holds appeal for individuals of widely varying abilities and interests in hospitals and health agencies, in industry and public health, in teaching, supervision and research.

For the Catholic lay nurse, it becomes ever wider in scope, embracing all men as members of Christ's Mystical Body, destined for eternal happiness in Heaven.

"Statistics point out," Sister said, "that there are present in the United States nearly 235 religious communities of women. Of this number, approximately 30 are devoted primarily to nursing."

ing. To date, these sisters have built over 800 general hospitals and over 120 sanitariums. More than 70,000 religious are actively engaged in nursing today.

"THE FIGURES WOULD seem to indicate that numerically there are enough sister-nurses to meet the demands made upon them in our country.

"However," Sister added, "factors contribute to increased use of hospital facilities under both religious and lay direction. Among these are rising trends in the population, growing participation in hospitalization insurance plans, expanded health services, developments in methods of treatment and increased life span."

Comments of religious superiors in recent years point to the urgent need for generous, well-qualified young women to fill the ranks not only in nursing communities—but also—in other areas of the Church's Apostolate. IN AN AVERAGE general hospital such as St. Joseph's Elmira, patients expect and like to see a Sister-nurse in each clinical area.

Actually, the number of Sister nurses absorbed in hospital administration, as well as in nursing school administration and nursing school faculty make it impossible to have a Sister-nurse in each clinical area.

Since St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing graduated its

first class in 1911, 23 of its alumnae have entered religious communities. Eighteen of this number have entered the Sisters of St. Joseph of Rochester. Trintean sisters of the Rochester community have graduated from the School of Nursing at St. Joseph's after entering religious life. Eleven Sisters of the community have received their degree in nursing from Nazareth College, Rochester.
