Holy Name Slates Bowling Tourney

The 24th annual Holy Name five-man handicap bowling tournament will be rolled for 23 consecutive days, Saturday, April 18 through Sunday, May 10, at the Airport Lanes, 351 Buell Rd., near Brooks Ave.

The tournament, sanctioned by the American Bowling Congress and under the auspices of the Catholic Men's Bowling Association, is expected to attract 1,200 teams from New York State and northern Pennsylvania.

THE TOURNAMENT fee is \$20 per team of which \$10.75 will be used for prizes. All Catholics who are members of the American Bowling Congress may participate. The highest average in any league last year will be used with the scratch average being 950 pins. Handicap is based on 70 per cent of the difference between the team average and that figure.

No team over the 950 average may enter. Entrants may bowl only once. Entries will be accepted until March 28. Reserve entries are due by March 23.

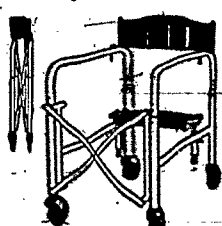

Dr. Palmer, in a very interesting and informative talk, discussed some of these misconceptions. The speaker emphasized that there should be no stigma attached to mental illness. He also pointed out that mental illness as such is not caused by overwork. Neither is sex responsible for all mental illness.

He pointed out the importance of correct concepts discipline and punishment in dealing with children and concluded his talk with a statement that more hospital beds are used for emotional upsets than for all other illnesses combined.

Dr. Palmer's talk was followed by the business meeting. At the close of the meeting, refreshments were served with St. Joseph's Hospital alumnae as hostesses.
