CORPUS CHRISTI. Dr. Thomas E. Gallagher, orthopedic surgeon on staffs of St. Mary's and Highland Hospitals will be guest speaker at Feb. 16 in a setting of the Confraternity of Christian Mothers. A "Doctor at Calvary" will be his topic.

Dr. Gallagher will evaluate the Passion and Death of Christ as seen by a physician with a knowledge of human suffering. Source of this information is the Holy Shroud of Turin with which Veronica wiped the face of Jesus. Gospel narratives corroborate in striking detail facts drawn from the scientific examination of the shroud. It is said. Rosary will be recited in Church preceding the meeting.
