### Water Shortage Threatens Cathedral

Venice — (NC) — The great golden Basilica of St. Mark's which is literally surrounded by the sea has the experts worried because there is not an adequate water supply in case of fire.

Although like everything else in Venice St. Mark's stands on an island crisscrossed by canals, new water pipes are being laid in the square. The

church and most of the nearby historic buildings are of stone but there is still enough wood in various parts of the structures to make the threat of fire serious.

At the same time the many domed Byzantine church is undergoing extensive repairs both inside and out. Many of the 11th century mosaics near the sanctuary of the church have been removed and then replaced piece by piece after the underwall had been reinforced and strengthened.

Restorers have found serious cracks in some of the columns of the atrium or front porch. Future reinforcement is indicated for the vaults, pillars and arches of the church.

Ol' the many statements attributed to Abraham Lincoln strike a more responsive chord than his generous "All that I am, or ever hope to be, I owe to my mother."

To the children, we were thrilled by the quotation because it clothed in words our lamentably articulate feelings; as adults, hearing those words, we wonder if we have ever adequately expressed to our parents the loving gratitude we acknowledge we owe them.

For many of us death has taken the opportunity of thanking our parents, of expressing even in little material ways, our grateful love; however, we remember them in our prayers and they are always in our hearts.

THERE ARE, however, women living among us who are in a sense "Other Mothers" or second mothers to us. Under the customs of our society they took us in our early years and patiently worked to shape our minds and hearts into those of good Catholic men and women.

I refer, of course, to the teaching Sisters who instructed us in our wilful youth. In a day when grade classes were

so heterogeneously grouped that almost any classroom was a conglomeration of instructional problems, they worked patiently to bring out the best in each of us.

Each of us would gladly make any sacrifice no matter how great to make more comfortable the remaining earthly life of our own mothers.

In the same line of reasoning, we should be willing to help each in her own way and according to her own conscience, to help in the building of the infirmary for the aged and sick-nurs, our second mothers, who once gave all their youth and strength to start us on our life's way.

TAKE ANY one parish and consider the number of boys and girls who have come under the instruction of the Sisters. Think of the wonderful teaching given in that school.

Pick out several young people who by extra help and encouragement and supervision have been assisted to go on to better schools of learning to win scholarships and financial assistance because of their good educational background.

To provide facilities for care of such dedicated teachers is a debt of justice. We all owe that debt.
