Guatemala City — (RNS) — Amid the cheers and banners of an enthusiastic populace, Francis Cardinal Spellman Archbishop of New York, rides with President Miguel Ydigoras, on his arrival at La Aurora airport here as Papal Legate to the First Central

American Eucharistic Congress. The Guatemala president, accompanied by members of the Cabinet and the diplomatic corps, as well as leading Church dignitaries, met Cardinal Spellman when he arrived and later saw him presented with the keys of the city.

Intelligent Investing

South Bend — (NC) — An automobile industry executive urged fellow businessmen here to transfer "what now amounts to" five per cent of their federal income taxes to private educational institutions.

Termining such a practice in intelligent investing, A. J. Porta, executive vice president of the Studebaker-Packard Corporation here, said funds so directed would "help keep the Federal Government out of U.S. education."

Mr. Porta spoke at a luncheon that launched the business and professional phase of a \$500,000 fundraising campaign being conducted by St. Mary's College in the South Bend area.

He said that corporations which donate tax deductible money to private institutions:

- Strengthen and enlarge in-

stitutions in their own back yards.

• Support institutions which must be counted on to help supply a constant flow of professionals who enter the life and future of a community.

• Help to lessen the demand for larger and larger tax supported programs.

The South Bend area drive is part of a nationwide campaign for two million dollars, which the college for women will spend for expansion. St. Mary's is conducted by Sisters of Holy Cross.

Red Schools Lure African Students

Rotterdam — (NC) — Bishop Charles Msakila of Karema, Tanganyika, called here for a substantial increase in the number of scholarships enabling young Catholic Africans to study at Western universities.

The prelate, who was on a brief tour of the Netherlands, pointed to the fact that the communist world is making an all-out effort to offer African youth numerous opportunities of studying at universities of the Soviet Union and in eastern Europe.

THE BISHOP noted that 3,000 African students are studying free of cost at the universities of Moscow and Leningrad, as well as at similar institutions in Czechoslovakia and other Iron Curtain Nations.

He added that 1,000 young citizens of Tanganyika alone are now attending communist universities, while only a few are enrolled at Western institutions of higher learning.

The 39-year-old African Bishop, recently named to head the See of Karema, was one of eight prelates consecrated to the episcopate by Pope John XXIII in St. Peter's basilica the past December 27.

Turning to the immediate problems of his new task, Bishop Msakila said that his diocese needs at least 200 more priests, 80 elementary schools, four hospitals and a secondary school.
