Aquinas To Host Debators

One hundred and twenty youthful orators from New York, State, Pennsylvania and Canada will vie for honors in the annual Aquinas Institute State Invitation Debating Tournament Feb. 28.

Sixty teams representing fifteen schools will participate according to Rev. Joseph A. O'Reilly, C.S.B., director of speech and moderator of the debating club of the Basilian Fathers' school.

Twenty-eight prominent local lawyers of the Monroe County Bar Association will act as judges. Topics for the debate will be: Resolved that membership in a labor organization as a condition of employment should be illegal.

THE SCHOOL winning the greatest total points will receive a handsome trophy donated by the Gannett Newspapers. The trophy may be kept for one year or until required by a particular school. Presentation will be made by Ira Sapoznik, of the public relations department of the Gannett Newspapers.

Division winners and the best boy and girl speakers will receive trophies donated by the North East Kiwanis Club.

Several public and private schools will send observers to witness the tournament.

HIGHLIGHT of the day will be a banquet attended by 225 people including debaters, coaches, judges and guests. Vary Mark E. P. Stage, C.S.B., principal, is honorary chairman of the tournament.

An host school Aquinas Institute will take part in the debates but will not be eligible for the awards.
