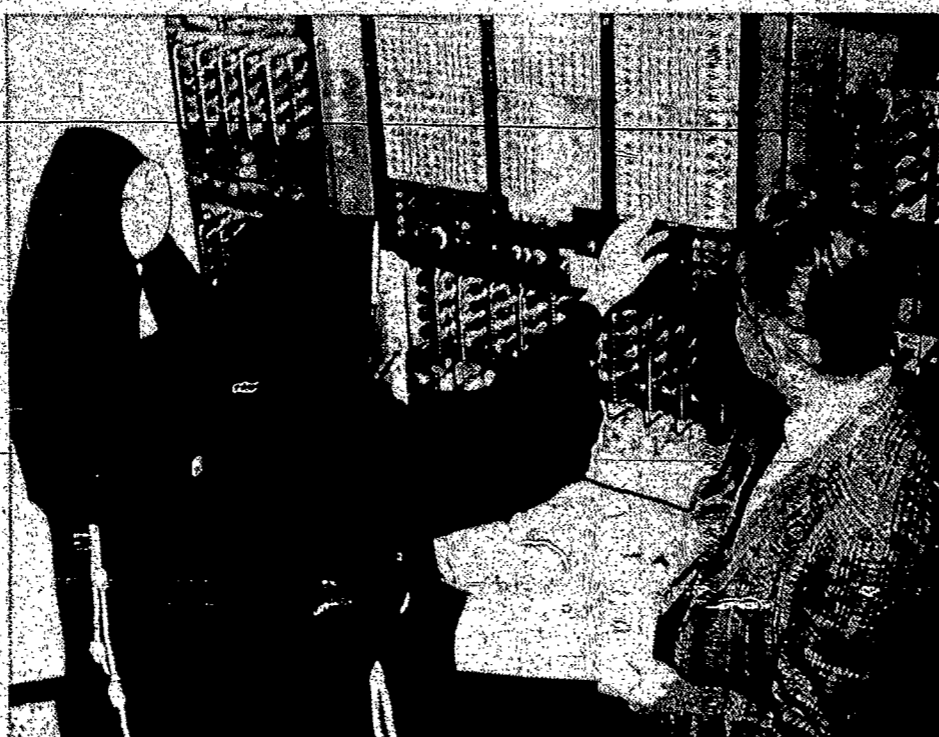

**Conformity Called 'Greatest Sin' By Elmira Editor At KC Breakfast**

Corning — Addressing about 60 members of Corning Council, Knights of Columbus, at a Communion Breakfast at the Baron Steuben Hotel last Sunday morning, Jim Morse, managing editor of the Elmira Advertiser newspaper in Elmira, N. Y., called for expression of individual thought and said that conformity is one of the greatest sins.

MR. MORSE, a popular Southern Tier newspaper columnist and news broadcaster in addition to his newspaper managing assignments, chose as a subject, "Smiles in These Troubled Times."

The men gathered at the hotel after receiving Holy Communion in a body at the 8:30 Mass at St. Mary's Church.

"We are part of a crowd," he said. "Always 'we' instead of 'I.'" He said in this situation, a person loses the sense of love and individuality.

"When a man forgets the meaning of 'I,'" he said, "he loses the ability to love, worship and think."

His recommendations were: "DON'T PANIC; don't over-dramatize; don't spend time on regrets when you take the first step; don't hurry; take no step before making sure in your own mind, and never admit defeat."

Introduced at the breakfast were the Rev. Thomas F. Brennan, pastor of St. Mary's Church who gave the invocation and benediction; Edward Glavin of Elmira, Knight of Columbus district deputy; T. V. Hanley, breakfast chairman and faithful navigator of the Corning Council, Fourth Degree Assembly; Gene Gilson, Corning Council deputy grand knight; Charles W. Houston, past grand knight and Mayor George E. Keenan; Joseph E. Hayes, was toastmaster.

T. V. HANLEY was chairman for the breakfast, assisted by Charles Houston, Eugene Gilson and W. W. Babcock.

Last evening (Thursday), the Rev. Desires Standerwick, S.A., led a Lenten discussion session following the regular Knights of Columbus meeting at the KC Home, Fr. Standerwick is a member of the Catholic Press Club and associate editor of the LAMP magazine.

It was announced following a recent meeting of the Council, that Mr. Houston will serve as Council chairman of the New York State Knights of Columbus oratorical contest March 15, Catholic high school seniors of the area wishing to enter should contact Mr. Houston or Grand Knight James Bothe for application blanks and further details.
