

Corning — Addressing a group of 60 members of Corning Council, Knights of Columbus, at a Communion Breakfast at the Baron Steuben Hotel last Sunday morning, Jim Morse, managing editor of the Elmira Advertiser newspaper in Elmira, N. Y., called for expression of individual thought and said that conformity is one of the greatest sins.

MR. MORSE, a popular Southern Tier newspaper columnist and news broadcaster in addition to his newspaper managing assignments, chose as his subject, "Smiles in These Troubled Times."

The men gathered at the hotel after receiving Holy Communion in a body at St. Mary's Mass at St. Mary's Church.
