

# Tournament Set

The Eighth Annual C.Y.O. Diocesan Basketball Tournament will be held in the gymnasium of the Columbus Civic Center on March 13, 14 and 15, Howard Meath, program director announced today.

Sixteen teams will compete in the tournament. They are composed of high school and elementary school boys of the C.Y.O. parish basketball league of Rochester and Monroe County, and the C.Y.O. Central Diocesan League from Canandaigua, Newark, Geneva, Penn Yan, Waterloo and Auburn.

**AN AWARD BANQUET** honoring the champions will be held on Sunday, March 15. The Most Reverend James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, will preside and will present trophies to the champions.

Joseph Murphy of Oakland Drive is general chairman of the program, assisted by Lyle Corletta. Other committee members are William Wolven, finance chairman; Robert Wilson, house committee chairman; and Mrs. Helen Smith of the C.Y.O. staff, cheerleading chairman.

McQuaid has been aiming for its two major games with Franklin and Aquinas all season. They defeated Franklin, the Interscholastic League champions, in a non-league game two weeks ago. Saturday night Aquinas and McQuaid met for the first time in an athletic contest.

# Mercy's 'Quill' Rated 'Tops'

The Quill, student publication of Our Lady of Mercy High School, has merited one of the two national CSMC press awards, given for the first time this year. This announcement by Msgr. Edward A. Freking, Executive Chairman of the CSMC, came on Feb. 28, the last day of Catholic Press Month. The Student Press Paladin Award is a special award from the CSMC honor society, the Order of Crusade Paladins.

**THE QUILL** received the award in recognition for the best single presentation of the mission apostolate during the scholastic year 1958-1959. The other award, presented to Twin Towers of Providence High School, Chicago, is for the best computing department dealing with the mission apostolate.

The Rochester high school paper, published by the Journalism class, received this award specifically for the issue of November 15, 1958, in which two entire pages were devoted to mission problems, personalities, and activities.

**IN TESTIMONY** of the honor, The Quill may display a special insignia in their newspaper. Personal Press Paladin citations were awarded to the students who wrote or designed the prize winning issue.

The ability of the article to arouse or develop interest in the missions and to encourage readers to effective participation in the mission apostolate was one of the chief factors considered by the judges. Equally important was the accuracy of the information about the mission work of the Church.

**FEATURED IN THE** prize winning publication of THE QUILL was an editorial by Ann Price concerning spiritual gifts for the missions. "This gift," she wrote, "cannot be touched, put on, or eaten, yet, it fulfills the needs of both hunger and madness. It feeds the starving soul with the nourishment of life and clothes the naked soul with the knowledge of Christ."
