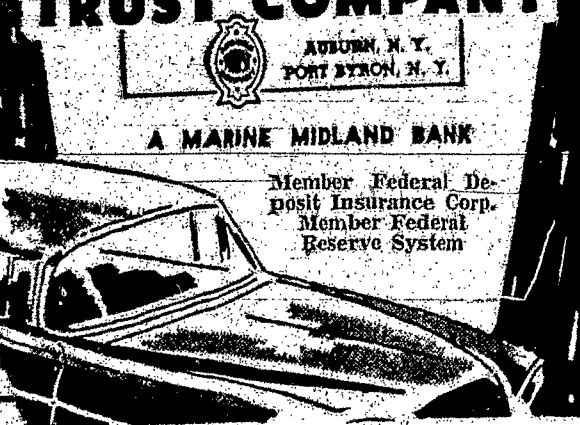

New De Sales Chapel Honors Sacred Heart

Geneva—First Mass was celebrated Feb. 24 in the new DeSales High School chapel by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Edward K. Ball, V.F., in the presence of faculty and student body representatives.

Present were Sister Marie Margaret, S.S.C. principal of DeSales, Rev. John A. Duffy and Rev. Raymond Ringwood of St. Stephen's Parish and Rev. Daniel Torrey of St. Francis DeSales Parish, and Rev. Richard A. Hart, chaplain at DeSales.

CLASS OFFICERS and six representatives from each class also were in the chapel. The entire student body participated in the Missa Recitata by means of the public address system.

Previous to the Mass, the Blessed Sacrament was transferred from St. Stephen's Church in solemn procession by Father Hart attended by the boys of the Senior Class.

The problem of converting a classroom into a chapel was given to the firm of William J. Woerner & Sons of Rochester. The altar, which was built of oak, has behind it a retables panel of the same select grained wood which rises almost to the ceiling where a canopy or tester extends out over the altar. On the altar stands a bronze tabernacle, and the golden tone is the bronze XP emblem on the altar front.

A gold framed picture of the Sacred Heart, the gift of Bishop Kearney, is centered on the retables panel. The chapel has been named the Chapel of the Sacred Heart at the request of the Bishop.

Light through the windows is controlled and softened by stained glass of varied amber tones, broken with random spots of red and accented with center borders of blue. These are done in contemporary design and contain the cross and fish symbols in the upper panel and the descending dove symbol of the Holy Ghost.

THE CHAPEL seats 32 people comfortably in eight pews of light oak. Kneelers are comfortably cushioned and the soft green color of the walls is complemented by the light gray tone of the oak woodwork in driftwood finish.

Cuban Workers Seek Reforms

Havana—(NC)—Cuba's Young Christian Workers marked the 12th anniversary of their movement here with a public statement demanding productive work, technical education and fair wages.

Referring to the regime of ousted dictator Fulgencio Batista, the declaration listed the "serious lack of opportunities for productive work" as one of the major factors that contributed to "the establishment of the bloody dictatorship in our country."

THE STATEMENT urged the government of Premier Fidel Castro, the Confederation of Cuban workers, and labor and industrial leaders, to draw up and enforce a complete labor reform program.

Among the various points to

be taken under consideration, the YCW listed:

1) legislation to protect the working rights and future of young laborers, particularly with regard to apprenticeship and the right to form trade union movements;

2) adequate minimum wages as well as suitable working hours and conditions, based on the "respect for morale";

3) general and technical education of young workers, including an increase in schools and vocational institutes to combat illiteracy in Cuba where, out of 100 children who enter schools, only four reach the sixth grade and 34 per cent of the population cannot read or write;

4) measures to protect workers from the effects of mechanization and automation, particularly in the powerful sugar industry. An estimated 10,000 jobs have been eliminated and working hours were cut by the thousands during the past few years as a result of industrial mechanization.
