Geneva Teenager Quoted In 'Shield'

The ideas of a Geneva high school student regarding the amount of money students should give to the church were contained in the March issue of the national magazine of the Catholic Students' Mission Society, published here.

John J. Powers, DeSales High School, felt that a definite amount of fund-raising projects such as bazaars, dances, etc., should be included in the average student's budget. However, if the amount of donations were increased, the average of two sounds reasonable.
