

Cenacle Nuns Plan Benefit Card Party

Eighth annual card party for the benefit of the Convent of Our Lady of the Retreat in the Cenacle is announced for Wednesday, April 15 at 8 p.m. at Columbus Civic Center. The benefit is being sponsored by a large committee composed of members of the various guilds, clubs and friends of the Cenacle. Miss Margaret G. Colgan and Mrs. Raymond Drysdale are Co-Chairmen, to assist Bishop James E. Keane, as Honorary Chairman.

Proceeds from the card party will assist in the expansion program of the Cenacle Retreat House at 693 East Avenue. Connecting with the original building will be the Diocese of Rochester in 1947 by the late Mrs. Nora Conway Todd, the addition will consist of three floors and basement served by an elevator.

THE NEW WING to be completed in April, 1960, will contain a Retreat Chapel where retreat conferences will be held in an instruction room or meeting hall for discussion groups, guild meetings, catechism classes, and additional bedrooms for retreatants as well as additional living quarters for the nuns.

The Rochester Cenacle, established in 1948 with five religious, as a Retreat House for women of the diocese is one of the largest in the country.

GOD LOVE YOU!

Every time you sin drive a nail into a board. One nail for the barred word to a friend, another for boasting, another for jealousy and so on for each sin committed. When you have sinned both God and your neighbor for pardon pull out a nail for the forgiveness of each sin. What do you have left?

There is, you see, a difference between forgiveness and reparation. That is why in the confessional your sins are not only forgiven you are also given a penance. However, the penance which is given does not always fill up the big holes.

So, you see, we must constantly do penance. The first sermon of John the Baptist, the first sermon of Our Lord, the last sermon of Paul—all were on the subject of penance, reparation or filling up the holes in the board of life. The question we must answer is—How can we do adequate penance?

- 1) Pray. Pray for sinners and in particular for the one billion five hundred million people of the Missions who do not yet know that Christ is the Light of the world.
- 2) Fast. Fasting and other forms of self-denial depress the passions and enlighten the mind.
- 3) Sacrifice. Give alms, sacrifice what you have for the poor. Notice, "for the poor."

The poorer those who receive your charity, the more dire their need, the more your aid draws them to the Christ who inspired your sacrifice, the greater will be your reward. Our Lord said invite not the rich to your table for the rich can pay you back. Invite the poor who have nothing to return. So the Lord will have to reward you.

What is the greatest of all charities. The Holy Father said that charity to the Society for the Propagation of the Faith exceeded all other charities, as heaven, earth, and eternity. When a multitude of appeals come to you and you know not what to do—put the problem into the hands of your Father, give to the Holy Father. He aids all the missionaries in all places. Whenever you send your sacrifices to one of his Diocesan Offices or to the National Office of his Society for the Propagation of the Faith you send it to him!

Adult Sodalis Plan Meet

On the heels of a most successful Day With Mary, a study day for the youth Sodalis of the Diocese, Father Edmond Steinkirchner, Diocesan Director of Parish Sodalis, announced plans this week for an Adult Sodality Congress to be held on Sunday, April 12, at St. John Fisher College.

Miss Kathleen Bond, Instructor of Candidates in the Young Adult Sodality of the Parish Sodality Union, has been appointed general chairman of this Congress.

According to Father Steinkirchner, the purpose of this Congress is to unite and to strengthen the adult Sodalis and the adult Sodalis of the Diocese in order that they may become "truly Mary's visible hands on earth, and also to prepare these Sodalis for their participation in the World Federation of Sodality Convention to be held in Newark next August.

At Home With Trudy McNall
Easter Bunny Cake

Spring is just around the corner, and so is Easter. With this in mind I just couldn't resist telling you how to make a clever Easter Bunny Cake. Place in the center of your Easter table and it will cause excitement galore. The little bunny, with his true-to-life paper ears and his pink mini neck, wears a bow about his neck and a fluffy marshmallow mold or equipment. Just follow these simple directions and you can match the photograph to a T.

- EASTER BUNNY CAKE**
Yield: 1 - 5 cup glass baking bowl mold
1 - 10 ounce glass baking bowl mold
1/2 c. shortening
1 c. sugar
2 eggs
1 t. vanilla
2 c. cake flour
3 t. baking powder
1/4 c. milk

Cream shortening and sugar. Add salt and vanilla. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Sift flour, baking powder, add alternately with milk to the mixture until well blended. Lightly grease and flour bowls. Fill 10 ounce glass bowl 1/2 full. Pour remainder of batter into 5 cup glass bowl. Bake at 300 degrees - 10 ounce bowl about 30 minutes, and 5 cup bowl about 20 and 15 minutes. Cool for 20 minutes, remove from bowl placing molds upside down, one in front of the other to form the head and body.

Ham can be an economical buy this Easter season. First because prices have been lowered due to extra-heavy supplies and second because by using the meat wisely you can stretch it into several meals. Canned ham is a wonderful treat, yields about 5 servings per pound. Cook it quickly even though it costs more, the cost per serving would be probably about the same as buying ham with bone in at a seemingly much lower price.

For delectable eating look for a Genuine Imported Atlanta Polish Ham. It comes in 3 pound and 5 pound tins (larger sizes are available). It's fully cooked, boneless, has no waste and no excess fat and the flavor is superb. This ham needs only a little heating in the oven to serve it hot, about 10 minutes per pound. To make a beautiful and delicious glaze spread with orange marmalade before baking in the oven at 350 degrees.

"HOT CROSS BUNS—HOT CROSS BUNS"—If you interest your daughters feed them to your sons—so goes the little verse we sang as youngsters. Now traditional for Easter, these buns are best "homemade" but a Hot Roll Mix makes it so easy for Mother to turn out the best rolls ever.

HOT CROSS BUNS
1 package Pillsbury Hot Roll Mix
1/2 c. warm water
1 egg
1 c. currants
3 T. chopped citron
1 t. cinnamon
Sprinkle yeast from Hot Roll mix over warm water in large bowl; stir to dissolve. Add egg, currants, citron, cinnamon and dry mix. Mix well. Let rise in warm place 85 degrees F. until double in size 30 to 45 minutes. Divide dough into 16 equal portions and shape into round balls. Place on lightly greased baking sheets. Let rise in warm place until light and double in size, about 30 minutes.

FROST WITH SNOWY CREAM
Frosting made by combining 1/2 c. shortening, then adding 3/4 c. sifted confectioner's sugar, 1/2 c. milk, 1 t. salt and 1 t. vanilla. Beat until smooth and creamy. Frost bunny and cover with 1/2 c. Angel Flake Coconut. Decorate with pink mints for eyes and half mint for nose, striped ribbon bay as long pink paper ears and three marshmallows covered with frosting and coconut for the tail.

Incidentally when you are ready to eat the cake slice the body cutting into the center just like a round cake. Save the bunny head until last. I'll just bet your Easter Bunny Cake will cause lots of excitement. . . he is surely a reproduction of Mr. Peter Cottontail.

Ham seems to be our traditional Easter meat and how wonderful it tastes after the fasting days of Lent. Today there's some delectable ham to fit the size of every family. . . sometimes a whole ham, however glamorous, looks like a lot of meat, and it is, but just remember there are a lot of dishes you can make with what's left over.

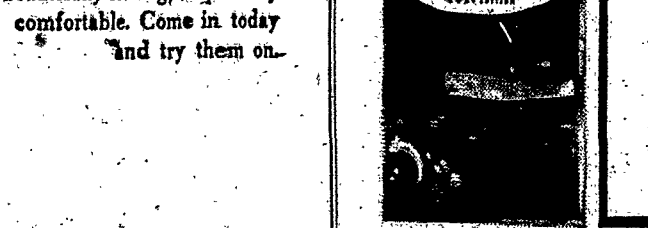
