

## Easter Mass, Ceremonies Mark Resurrection Feast

Easter Sunday morning Bishop Kearney will celebrate Solemn Pontifical Mass in Sacred Heart Cathedral at 11 a.m. Holy Saturday ceremonies, previous to 1936 were observed in most churches on Saturday morning. Holy Saturday rites are now held in the evening beginning at 10:30 or 11 p.m. as scheduled by individual pastors. Congregations will be urged to sing the responses and other chants of the Vigil service and Mass in accord with recent directions.

**THE HOUR LONG** rites preceding the midnight Mass will include blessing of the new fire and Easter candle, symbols of Christ rising from the dead. Water will be blessed for use in baptism and the litany of the saints will be chanted.

All ceremonies are to be conducted in such a way that the people will see and understand them.

Many pastors have arranged to have a priest in the pulpit to explain the rites while other priests conduct the ceremony in the sanctuary.

Holy Saturday will be marked as a day of fast and abstinence until midnight. Those bound to fast may eat once on that day. Those not obliged to fast may eat more than once.

**THERE WILL** be no church services on Holy Saturday morning.

Confessions will be heard Saturday afternoon and evening in preparation for Easter Communion.

Catholics desiring to receive Holy Communion at the Easter Vigil Mass are required to fast three hours from solids and one hour from liquids.

Good Friday is being observed today by many business firms closing for the day, others shutting down from noon to three p.m. to allow employees to take part in religious services. This practice was encouraged by the Fourth Degree Assembly of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus.

## F. E. Donnelly Mourned, Active In Church Affairs

Solemn Requiem Mass for Frank E. Donnelly, widely active in Catholic circles, a noted banker and citizen will be offered in St. Thomas Church, 41 Colebrook Drive, Irondequoit on Monday, March 30 at 9 a.m. The funeral services were conducted yesterday, Holy Thursday, March 26, at the home, 76 Harvington Dr. and in St. Thomas Church.

Mr. Donnelly, 61, whose civic, charitable and banking achievements compiled a formidable record, died at home, Monday, March 23, 1959 after a three-month illness.

Bishop Kearney imparted his blessing at the church service and commended Mr. Donnelly for his banking ability and Catholic activity. Rev. Msgr. Richard St. Burns, pastor, gave the blessing at the grave in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

Delegations of Sisters of St. Joseph and Sisters of Mercy attended. The Fourth Degree, Knights of Columbus honor guard and Irondequoit Post, American Legion handled the military services.

Beaters were: Mayor Peter Barry, James Hickey, Eugene R. Cusker, Joseph Weber, Charles Saffert and Howard Hawkins.

Trained in St. Mary's Boys Home, he rounded out his education at Rutgers University School of Banking where he lectured several times.

Loyal to the Sisters of St. Joseph who had taught him at the home, he devoted greatly of his time to assisting them and was chairman of the advisory committee of the recent appeal for the Sisters' Infirmary. He served also as a trustee of Nazareth College conducted by the Sisters.

He was a trustee and treasurer of Rochester Catholic Charities, a member of the board of the School of Nursing, St. Mary's Hospital, a trustee of Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, trustee and treasurer of St. Elizabeth's Guild House, and a member of the adoptions committee of Rochester Catholic Charities.

Active in the Knights of Columbus he had served through the Degree Assembly eventually becoming faithful navigator. During World War II he cooked for servicemen enroute to homes or duty stations and for men stationed at the Navy base at Sampson in the Knights of Columbus NOCC-USA program in the K. of C. rooms, Columbus Civic Center.

At the time he was taken ill, Mr. Donnelly was chairman of a Fourth Degree Ritual Equipment fund. He took a leading role in Rochester Assembly uniformed guard and was in charge of that unit for many years. He was active in St. Thomas parish.

His military career started on the Mexican Border in 1916 when he served with the United States Scout Headquarters Co. of the 27th Division. In World War I he was a first sergeant of infantry serving overseas. He was awarded the Purple Heart.

On return to this country he was a founder of Monroe County American Legion. He belonged to James E. Gelman and Memorial Post, American Legion, now combined, and was commander of each at one time. He also belonged to the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Downtown Post.

His civic activities were wide spread. He was a past treasurer of Friends Relief Fund of World War II, past vice president of the Council of Social Agencies Family and Children's Division, chairman of the Citizens Committee to Investigate Hospital Costs and a director of the Citizens Tax League.

Mr. Donnelly began his banking career in 1914 at Monroe County Savings Bank, advanced from clerk to assistant secretary in 1929 and to secretary in 1937. He was made vice president and secretary in 1942 and was elected to the board of trustees in 1951. He was manager of the bank's uptown office from 1937 until his retirement, last December.

Mr. Donnelly is survived by his wife, Mildred May Donnelly; four sons, Frank E. II, John E., Gerald J. and Peter G.; three brothers, Daniel, Port Orchard, Wash., Edmund and William Donnelly, New York City; four granddaughters; an uncle, John Donnelly, Port Gleerone, County Derry, Ireland.

Interment was in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery. Contributions to Mr. Donnelly's memory are being made to the Novitiate and Infirmary Building Fund of the Sisters of St. Joseph.

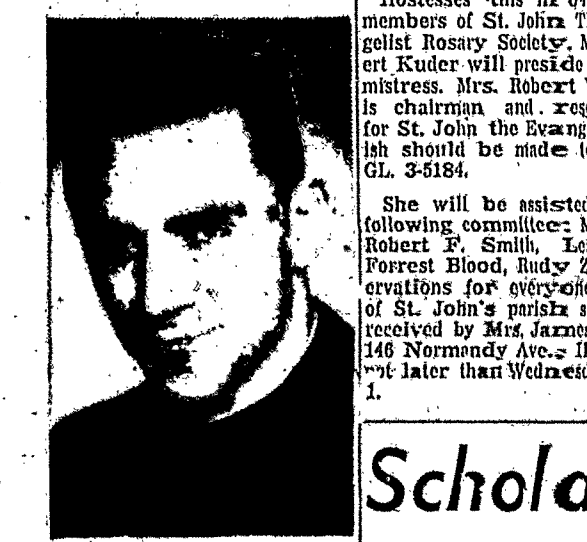

## Scholarship Open For Nursing

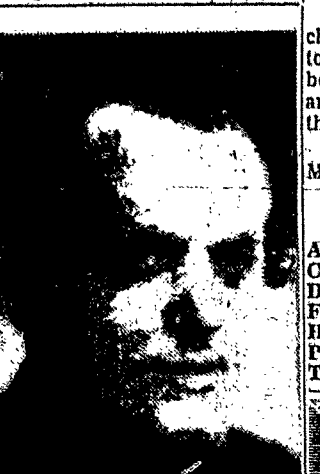
Geneva - Geneva Chapter, Catholic Nurses, is again sponsoring a full three-year nursing scholarship.
