Fried Chicken

They say April Showers bring
May Flowers and how welcome
they are, but just as pleasing to
the homemaker will be the
pleasant attractions in all the
stores, for she will find a rich
assortment of foods in the cate-
gory of "plentiful" which
means "good buys" to the
economy-wise shopper. Accord-
ing to the U.S. Department of
Agriculture, pork is a good
buy, so here's a chance to let
your family enjoy one of their
best-liked meats often.

OVEN FRIED CHICKEN
WITH GRAVY

or 2 frying chickens
or 4 or 6 parts
1 c. flour
1 t. salt
1/2 t. pepper
Shortening
1 T. chopped onion
1 can condensed
cream of chicken soup
parsley

Look for egg prices to be
lower, so make the most of
them not only for that daily
breakfast egg but for delicious
main dishes and desserts. Broil-
ers are another attractive
meat item high on the list of
plentiful chickens can be pre-
pared in so many different
ways that they never need
tired of it.

Place fat (Planters Peanut
oil is best) in heavy skillet to
depth of 1/2 inch. Heat until
hot. Combine flour and season-
ings. Shake pieces of chicken
in flour in paper bag to coat
evenly. Fry until golden
brown. Place browned chicken
in shallow baking dish. Pour
off excess oil except 2 T.
Brown onion in fat, add soup
and bring to a boil, scrape all
excess brown from frying pan.
Four gavy per chicken. Bake
uncovered at 400 degrees for
45 to 60 minutes until chicken
is fork tender.

These days there can be
chicken in almost every pot
(and Henry IV. of France said
that long before our political
situation) and why not? It is
plentiful, comparatively inex-
pensive and available in many
forms. While half chickens are
cut up, or your favorite parts
here is a wonderfully simple
chicken recipe for you.

Group To Aid
Hungary Exiles

Louvain — (RNS) — Plans
to set up an organization in
Rome of Catholic Hungarian
youth in exile with a perma-
nent representation at the Vati-
can were approved here. The
organization will cater to the
spiritual, cultural and other
needs of refugees from Com-
munist Hungary.

The action took place at a
Sunday congress of some 7,000
Catholic Hungarian youth from
many parts of the world which
was formally opened by Bishop
Monte van Waeyenberg, rector
of the Catholic University of
Louvain. Chief topics discussed
were the attitudes and spiritual
and other problems of Hun-
garian youth, especially young
intellectuals, who left their
country following the Hungar-
ian anti-Communist revolt of
October, 1956.

Rites Bless
Farm Work

Green Bay — (RNS) — Farm
animals and machinery, and
bowls of seeds and soil were
blessed in various Roman Cath-
olic parishes of the Green Bay
diocese at services marking
Rural Life Days.

At a ceremony in Lens, the
Rev. Michael Dineen of Des
Moines, Ia., executive director
of the National Catholic Rural
Life Conference's Country
Beautiful Program, declared
that farm families have more
opportunities than those in
cities in achieving "holiness,
happiness and security — the
real goals of life."

This advantage of life on
the land," he said, "can be lost
for your children unless you
keep thinking and acting in
union with the Christian direc-
tion of the Church that has
witnessed the uprooting of
families from the land across
the centuries in most countries
of the world."

British Medics Withdraw
Controversial Guide Book

London — (NC) — The British Medical Association at
a private meeting confirmed its recent action in with-
drawing its booklet "Getting Married," which had been
attacked as immoral.

The booklet originally issued
by the Association governing
body of the British medical
profession, at the beginning of
March immediately raised a
storm of protest.

N.Y. Buddhists
Protest Brutality

United Nations — (RNS) —
Led by six Buddhist priests,
more than 100 members of
the American Buddhist Com-
munity protested at the United
Nations the "bloody terror car-
ried on by the Chinese Commu-
nists against the people of
Tibet."

Carrying anti-Red banners,
the Buddhists presented a peti-
tion to the U.N., urging that
it prevail upon the Chinese Reds
to respect the sanctity of the
Daili Lama, the spiritual head
of the Buddhist Buddhists.

The Kolmuk community in
the U.S. — numbers some 800
men, women and children. They
are among the few survivors of
a once great nation which em-
igrated to Russia several cen-
turies prior to the Communist
revolution. The great majority
of their people were deported
en masse by Moscow from their
ancestral homelands to Siberia
in 1923. No word has been
heard from them since.

nence, Richard Cardinal Cushing,
of Boston for the preservation of
the Faith in South America. In
March, sixteen priests were sent
as the vanguard of the new Society
to Peru and Bolivia where they
will work among Indians who have
not had the ministrations of a priest
for as long as thirty years. As of
September, His Eminence will ac-
cept students to study for the
priesthood as members of the Mis-
sionary Society of St. James the
Apostle.

The magnitude of the undertak-
ing is tremendous. The first group
of priests will work in an area con-
taining 375,000 souls. What His
Eminence needs and what his young
priests need at the beginning of
their venture are friends.

cieties, in all areas.

dispensaries, 300 leper colonies, and hundreds of thousands of
churches. Suppose that he did not give one cent for building
new churches, leper colonies, dispensaries, hospitals, orphanages
or schools, but gave the money on a day by day basis to the
individual missionaries. The amount each would receive per day
would be
