Jesuits Stress Science Need

Fairfield—(RNS)—Jesuit universities, colleges and high schools were urged by panelists at the annual meeting of the Jesuit Educational Association here to give greater attention to the sciences and place more scholarly demands on their students.

The panelists discussed the bearing of the technological age on various aspects of Jesuit education. Presiding was the Rev. Edward B. Rooney, S.J., of New York, president of the association.

Attending the meeting were 250 clergy and lay delegates from the 28 colleges and universities opened by the Jesuits in this country, as well as from other Jesuit educational institutions in the U.S., Canada, Cuba and Japan. The delegates included presidents of 26 of the 28 colleges and universities.

One of the panelists, the Rev. Patrick H. Yancey, S.J., of Spring Hill College, Mobile, Ala., noted that St. Ignace Loyola, founder of the Jesuits, stressed the study of the classics as the backbone of his educational system because "the classics were very attractive to the men of his age."

"We are living in an age of science," Father Yancey declared. "Therefore, following the example of Ignatius, it behooves us to make the sciences equally important in our educational system."

The Rev. William T. Costello, S.J., of Gonzaga University, Wash., described the division between technology and the humanities "as honey as the 19th century war between religion and science."

Eight Sisters of Mercy have won fellowships for graduate study in the fields of science and mathematics this past week.

The National Science Foundation has given grants to five faculty members of Our Lady of Mercy High School, enabling them to attend the university of their choice, with all expenses paid, including travel and maintenance.

Sister Mary Stanislaus was awarded a three-year summer program in chemistry, and has elected St. Louis University where she did graduate work last summer. Sister Mary Aquin will use her mathematics grant in a New York State university, not yet determined, in order to meet new state requirements in the field; she received her master's degree in mathematics at Notre Dame University last summer.

Sister Mary Edward has won a three-summer grant in earth science to continue graduate studies she has done in this area at St. Bonaventure and Syracuse University. Sister Mary Julia has won a two-summer fellowship for mathematics and will study new trends at Notre Dame University.

Nuns Seek U.S. Citizenship

Washington—(RNS)—Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) has introduced a bill in Congress to grant permanent residence to eight Spanish-born nuns of the Most Holy Redeemer Order who hope eventually to establish the work of their order in the United States.

The religious order does work with delinquent girls, the senator said. Presently the Sisters are studying and doing domestic work at St. Francis Xavier Missionary Seminary, Island Creek, Mass. Since they entered the country on student visas, they cannot remain to establish residence for citizenship unless Congress acts on their behalf. Sen. Kennedy introduced the bill (S. 1527) at the request of Msgr. William R. Hunter, director of the seminary, who praised the nuns' work.
