

Nursing Workshop Held At Hospital

A workshop for Nursing and Convalescent Home Proprietors is currently in session every Thursday night at the Dunn Memorial Residence, St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira. This workshop consisting of six lessons is co-sponsored by the Chemung County Nursing and Convalescent Home Proprietors Association and the Visiting Nurses and Health Association.

Approximately 50 proprietors and nursing home staff members are registered for the session. The first session was held on Thursday, March 19. Discus- sants at this first meeting were Miss Doris McQuaid, Director of Visiting Nurses and Health Association, whose topic was Orientation to the Workshop.

Following Miss McQuaid's talk, David S. Hurwitz, Area Director, and Miss Vivian Buchanan, R.N., representing State of New York Department of Social Welfare spoke to the group on the laws regulating the operation of Nursing Home Facilities. Both Hurwitz and Miss Buchanan have headquarters in Rochester.
