

Openings Available At Camp Columbus

Auburn — The 1959 Camp Columbus encampment will open June 28 for six weeks period for boys. The girls encampment will run three weeks starting August 9 according to an announcement made by the directors, the Rev. Robert Krenzel and the Rev. Gerard Connor.

Changes in rates have been announced with the following 1959 rates: St. Alphonsus parishioners, \$18 per week; all residents of Cayuga County, \$20 per week; all others \$22 per week. The directors point out that the change has been made to reduce the rates of St. Alphonsus boys since the parish is by its annual support of a Minister Show and other activities, bears the brunt of the camp's expenses.

VARIOUS CIVIC groups in Cayuga County contribute to the camp and for this reason the residents of the county will be accepted for lower rates than those outside. Father Krenzel points out that applications have been mailed this week to all who have filed letters of inquiry. Approximately 4,000 letters have been received, but there are openings in each of the encampment periods.

Camp Columbus is a Catholic camp for boys and girls founded in 1933 by the late Rev. Miss. Frederick G. Straub. It is now operated under the direction of the Rev. Francis C. Waterstrat, pastor of St. Alphonsus. The boys are supervised by priests and seminarians; the girls by priests and Catholic college students majoring in sociology.

India Art, Symbolism Discussed At Nazareth

Sister Magdalen, chairman of the Nazareth College Art Department, gave her second lecture on "Art in India," another in the Asian Studies program, last Wednesday.

In this lecture Sister Magdalen's theme was the necessity for a different approach to the understanding of Indian Art, which she says represents rather the illustration or interpretation of an idea, rather than an objective study of some subject.

YESTERDAY at the student assembly, Anthony Bertinucci, visiting professor from Oxford University addressed the student body on "Symbolism in Religious Art." In connection with the lecture he showed a series of colored slides.
