Rehearsals Underway For S.R.O.

Rehearsals are underway for the Nazareth College SRO—the annual spring dramatic production, for which Oscar Wilde's "The Importance of Being Earnest" has been chosen. Performances are scheduled at the College Auditorium, Thursday and Friday evenings, May 7 and 8.

Leading women's roles will be played by Miss Patricia Ripple, Syracuse, and Miss Gail Place, Bradford, Pa. Miss Ripple starred in last spring's SRO, "The Boy Friend" as well as in the college fall play, "The Heiress." She will play the part of Gwendolyn in this play.

Miss Place played the lead in the college Christmas play and "Christmas in the Village Square" and was Lady Macbeth in her high school production of Macbeth. Both of these young ladies are English majors with speech and drama as their minor and acting as their hobby.

Pheila Aiamo, who has been in a number of musicals in Rochester, will play the part of Maria; Mary Lou Eruker plays the part of Miss Prism and Sue Allegritti, Lady Bracknell.

CAST in the role of the doctor is Herlan Durman, who is well-known to Rochester Community Players audiences and to Arena Theatre-goers.

The other male lead is played by Michael Harnes, who plays the part of Uncle Jack. Harnes' English accent is genuine. He came to the United States in September 1948 from England and is now teaching furniture design at R.I.T.

The part of Algernon Moncrieff is also taken by an Englishman, John Dale, at present a resident of Australia. Dale was born in England and has also lived in Sweden and India. He is in the United States on a two-year visa, is employed at the Taylor Instrument Co. and will return to Australia. This is Mr. Dale's first play, although he has done some back stage work.

The role of the butler is played by James Knox, student of St. John Fisher College, who has been seen a number of times in productions, including "Times Remembered," "Good News" and "The Bourgeois Gentleman."

Miss Mary Ann Stackbeck, drama instructor at Nazareth, is directing the production.
