May Day seems by its very nature attuned to Our Lady, as are all the days following. The month is named for her. The reason itself embodies all she means to mankind: a richness of hope, spirit of recrudescence, link between human and Divine.

Inherent is an urge to attend Mass and receive Holy Communion each day. The presence of that home altar often provides just the needed nudge.

For children, that perennial symbol of family unity in prayer will probably carry over into homes whose members are now small saplings, and whose personnel are yet unborn.
