

Owasco Parish Rectory Blessed

Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence B. Casey presided over the blessing of the new Sacred Heart Rectory on Melrose Road Sunday, April 26. Assisting priests were Rev. Francis Waterman, Rev. William O'Brien, and the pastor, Rev. Raymond J. Wall.

The house, a ranch type, is situated on the north west corner of Sacred Heart Parish property, Owasco.

The north wing, or priest's quarters, is decorated in soft sandalwood and green tones. The south wing, which includes offices for parish business and housekeeper's room, is decorated in pastel pink. The living and dining rooms are in gray. The kitchen, with built-in freezer, refrigerator and wall oven is painted a sunny yellow. All rooms have contrasting draperies at spacious windows that look out on the school and lovely countryside.

ALL DECORATING, done entirely by volunteers from the parish, is under the supervision of Fred Kisser. Outside work, grading, seeding, etc. is under the supervision of Edward Galka, president of the Holy Name Society.

The Mothers' Club furnished the kitchen with copper utensils, dishes, and small electrical appliances and the Rosary Society had a linen shower for the rectory. The Holy Name Society held a party on Tuesday, May 5, and hopes to pay for the furnishing of one room.

The house will serve as temporary rectory until such time as the church and permanent rectory are completed.

Open house for the new rectory is set for Sunday, May 10, from 3 to 5 in the afternoon.
