## The Merry Month Of May



In the merry month of May, it seems to me that there is a sort of magic in the air that makes it a joyous great to be alive. The name of the month was probably borrowed from the name of a Roman-Greek goddess of Jupiter's day—Maia (or May), daughter of Atlas and mother of Mercury. May has become a part of our language in more ways than one. For instance, there is MAY DAY, the only May Day, which is the famous Air Corps dress signal in World War II, and the MAYPOLE, the MAY APPLE, a North American herb which bears a single white flower. MAY AIR, a fashionable section of London in which an annual May fair was once held, the MAYFLOWER, which brought the Pilgrims to our shores, MAYFLY, known to many a fisherman, MAY QUEEN, the girl who would be crowned to be the Queen of the May.

**MAY BRINGS STRAWBERRIES.** Strawberries have been popular around much of the world for centuries. Early explorers of North and South



STRAWBERRY CREAM PIE

1 c. currant jelly, melted and cooled  
1/2 c. cornstarch  
1 c. cold water  
1 pound cooked, cleaned, large fresh shrimp (about 15) Chinese Noodles

Combine cornflake crumbs and butter and mix evenly. Pack over bottom and sides of 9 inch pie plate. Chill.

### HAWAIIAN SWEET-SOUR SHRIMP

2 cans (1 1/2 c. ounces each) pineapple tidbits (about 3 cups)  
1 c. syrup from pineapple  
2 medium onions chopped  
2 medium green peppers, chopped  
1/2 c. vinegar  
2 T. Soy Sauce  
1/4 c. brown sugar  
1/2 t. salt  
1/2 t. garlic salt  
Dash pepper

## GOD LOVE YOU!

Worries and burdens never scatter; they always come to a head in some one person. Children in a family do not worry about where their food or clothes come from, but the father does. In a diocese, the burden of building schools and the spiritual condition of the clergy and the faithful falls on the shoulders of the Bishop. And in an even greater measure does the weight of the world's moral and spiritual condition fall on the Holy Father as the Vicar of Christ. If there be a harassment of missionaries as there is in India; if there be anti-religious political forces throttling religious education in Africa; if there be a persecution of the faithful in Vietnam or missionaries tormented by the reds in China—all these are concentrated in the one person who personifies the Church, namely the Holy Father.

His burden is like that of Our Lord in Gethsemane. It was not keys alone that Our Lord gave Peter and his successors; Our Lord also promised the Cross. To be Vicar of Christ is not just an honor; it is a sentence to suffer in every fiber of being as Jesus, the woe, the imprisonment, the fallings, the worries of the Church everywhere in the world.

Why do the Communists in China promise immunity from persecution if our missionaries and faithful deny the Holy Father? Why do they who deny the existence of God ask a denial of the Papacy? Because they instinctively know that once a head is decapitated the body may live for a while, but eventually it will die.

- What can we do?
- 1) We can pray for the Holy Father as the Church made intercession for Peter when he was in prison.
  - 2) We can make sacrifices for him. Cut into your capital and invest yourself a luxury and send it to him for the needs of the Church in Asia, Africa, Oceania and elsewhere.
  - 3) We can send our sacrifices to him through his own Pontifical Society for the Propagation of the Faith. Pontifical means belonging to the Pontiff.
  - 4) We can tell others that the Holy Father must have a society of this kind to assure the equal distribution throughout the world of our charity and sacrifice. While such religious group provides only for its members, he must provide for all societies in all places.
  - 5) Finally, we can rejoice to know that by making a sacrifice to the Holy Father we make an act of Faith in him as Vicar of Christ; an act of Hope for the spread of the reign of Christ throughout the world; an act of charity to him who above all else in this world is for us the one through whom Christ speaks.
