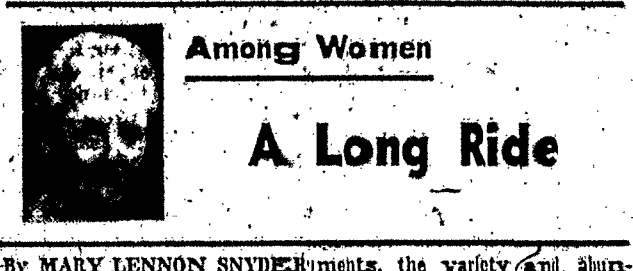
Slates Breakfast

Among Women A Long Ride

The Feast of Our Lady of Good Counsel saw me on a long and lovely ride en route to a Library Tea of the St. Ann's Deanery Council of Catholic Women. Late in the morning I left Auburn with a faithful friend, who having anticipated her Sunday so that I would not have to travel alone, had to endure the additional pangs of listening to me talk. We enjoyed our beautiful lake country, at we drove along Lakes Seneca and Keuka down into the hills of the Southern Tier.

AT HORNELL, the tea and display of Catholic literature were held in the Pine Room of St. Anne's Church. I suspect that St. Anne's school, has been built a long time, but its basement meeting room is far removed from the school buildings of my memory.
The rooms, as one might suspect from its name, was paneled. At one end there were neatly labeled bookshelves. The various grades could hang their outer clothing there. As is customary where women have an opportunity to exercise their innate excellence of homemakers, the tea was an artistic and gustatory success. A beautiful shrine of Our Lady dominated the tea-table scene. The array of table appointments, the variety and abundance of the confections would have taxed the descriptive powers of Washington Irving with all his gills in telling of the well laden festive tea tables of the Hudson Valley Dutch housewives.
Before and after the program I observed a lively interest in the excellent array of books and magazines. The display of books was most interesting, since it ranged all the way from inexpensive paper-covered books to magnificent deluxe editions.
THE PROGRAM opened with a group of songs presented by girls from St. Ann's Parish who are attending Horrell High School. Much can be learned about any group by observing its children and young people. These young girls reflected the interest and careful training which have been expended upon them, for they stood well, sang well, and were a joy to hear and to behold.
Thanks to the extra hour given us by daylight saving time we were home shortly after dark, thus pleasing our families who were glad to see us returning from our travels.
However, the day did not end for me with my return home, for my mind keeps returning to the interesting and delightful women I met in Hornell and to several of the inspiring and challenging conversations I had during the tea time, with individual women.

WROC To Sponsor Ski Show At Genesee Valley Park May 23

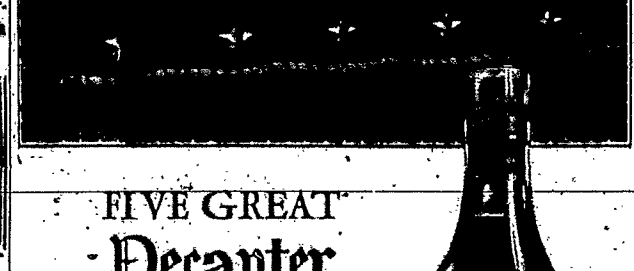

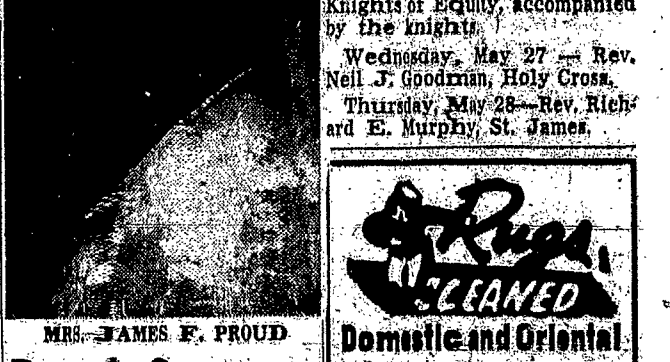
