

# Priests Mark Jubilee

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High school, St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries. He was ordained by Cardinal Mooney in St. Patrick's Cathedral June 10, 1934.

His first assignment was as curate at St. Mary's Church, Hammondport, where he held until he was appointed in 1939 as chaplain at Nazareth Academy, Rochester. In March, 1952, he became pastor of Holy Cross Church, Rochester, and in 1955 named to the Livonia Center and Honeyey parishes.

Father Tobin's pastorate at Hammondport and Prattsburg takes him at this time of year through the beautiful, rolling panoramas of Southern Ontario in the southern tier of the Diocese. His parish calls in winter months, however, are across highways and through snow-clogged roads. To meet Sunday morning Mass schedules at both churches is a challenge to the quiet jubilarian.

As sole priest in his far-flung parish, he must personally instruct children in the truths of their faith, take care of all sick calls, make parish visits besides administration of the two churches.

He was born in Rochester, Nov. 10, 1908, the son of Martin and Louise Tobin. He attended Corpus Christi school, St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries. He was ordained by Cardinal Mooney in St. Patrick's Cathedral, June 9, 1934.

Prior to his pastorate appointment in 1937, he served as curate in five parishes of the Diocese; St. Patrick's, Elmira; St. Charles Borromeo, Greece from 1937; St. Ignatius, Hornell, from 1941; St. Mary's, Corning, from 1944; and St. Cecilia's, Elmira, from 1953.

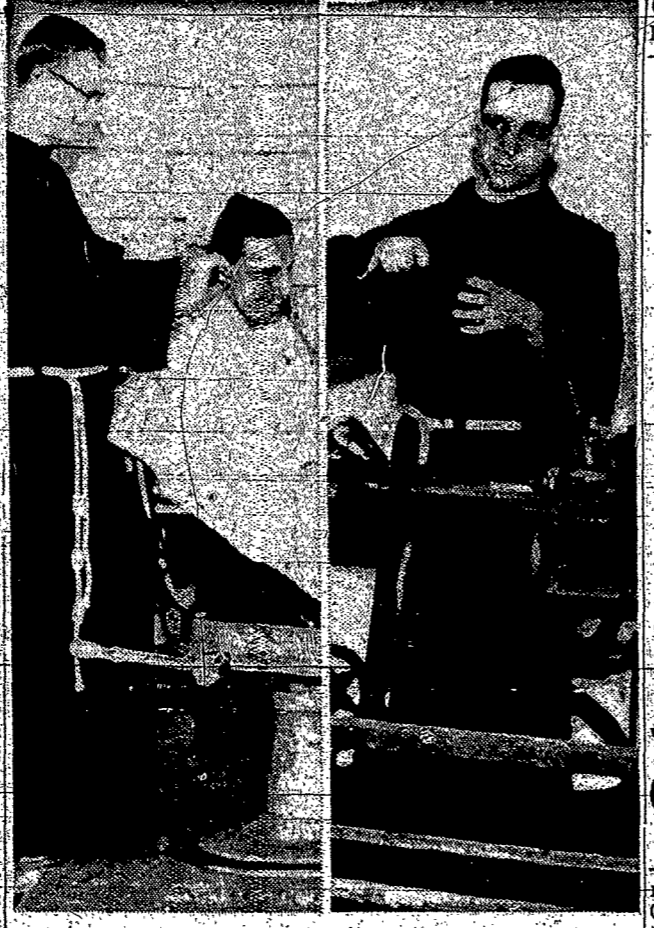
In his twenty-five years of priesthood, Father Tobin has been an assistant pastor in six parishes and pastor of two prior to his Corning assignment.

Following his ordination in 1934, he was named curate at St. Thomas Church, Irondequoit, in 1935 transferred to St. Anthony's Church, Rochester, in 1936, to St. Mary's Church, a suburb. He was appointed curate of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church, Rochester, in 1940, to St. Mary's Church, Canandaigua, in 1943, and to St. Ignace Loyola Church, Hornell, in 1945.

He became pastor of St. Bernard's Church, Scipio Center, with missions at St. Hilary's Church, Geneva, and St. Isaac Jogues, Church, Fleming, in 1950. In 1954, he was transferred to be pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Cato, and its mission of St. Thomas Church, Red Creek. He was appointed administrator of the Corning parish in 1957.

A native of Elmira, he was born March 20, 1908, the son of Michael and Nora Tobin. He attended St. Mary's school, Elmira Free Academy, Elmira.

He was first assigned as curate at Holy Rosary Church, Rochester, and then in 1939 transferred to St. Cecilia's Church, Elmira, and in 1940 to St. Patrick's Church, Rochester.

# Pontiff Grants 14 Audiences

Vatican City — (NC) — Tourists and other special groups coming to Rome have placed a heavy claim on the time of Pope John XXIII despite attempts to cut his schedule of audiences.

The weekday audiences have been reduced markedly, but the overflow accumulates, with the result that the Pope has to devote Sundays to visitors, despite his wish to have some time to himself.

The last Sunday of May illustrates the heavy demands made on the Pope's time.

He had indicated that he hoped the Sunday could be kept free. But the influx of visitors was so heavy that he had to give two extraordinary audiences on Sunday, and he made 14 speeches to special groups.

He began his morning by offering Mass in the Pauline Chapel for the papal household, concluding the month-long Marian ceremonies in which he has taken part. After Mass he delivered a short address on "Madonna, Our Mother."

THE FIRST of the two audiences was held in the Hall of

Benedictions for about 4,000 office employees of the Fiat automobile company, and groups from Turin and Crana. An hour later the Pope went to St. Peter's basilica, where more than 30,000 people were gathered.

Among the many groups the Pontiff addressed were delegates to the 10th World Real Estate Congress, with delegations from 36 countries, including the U.S.

After the audience, the Pope was present at a medieval show in St. Peter's Square, where costumed participants in Spanish famous horse race, called the techniques of twirling multi-colored flags.

After receiving various bishops in the afternoon, the Pope finally found time to retire to his library for what little was left of his "day of rest."

## Boy Makes First Communion In Jail

Rome — (NC) — A 14-year-old schoolboy made his first Communion here in the city's Regina Coeli jail so that his father could witness the rite.

First Communions in Italy are very important family occasions, so much so that although Italian Minister of Justice Guido Gonella found the boy's request to receive in the jail somewhat surprising, he nevertheless granted permission.

The boy, whose father is in jail pending trial, knelt at the altar rail in the jail's chapel while his father and other prisoners and members of his family watched.

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
