Hospital Alumnae Set Dinner, Dance

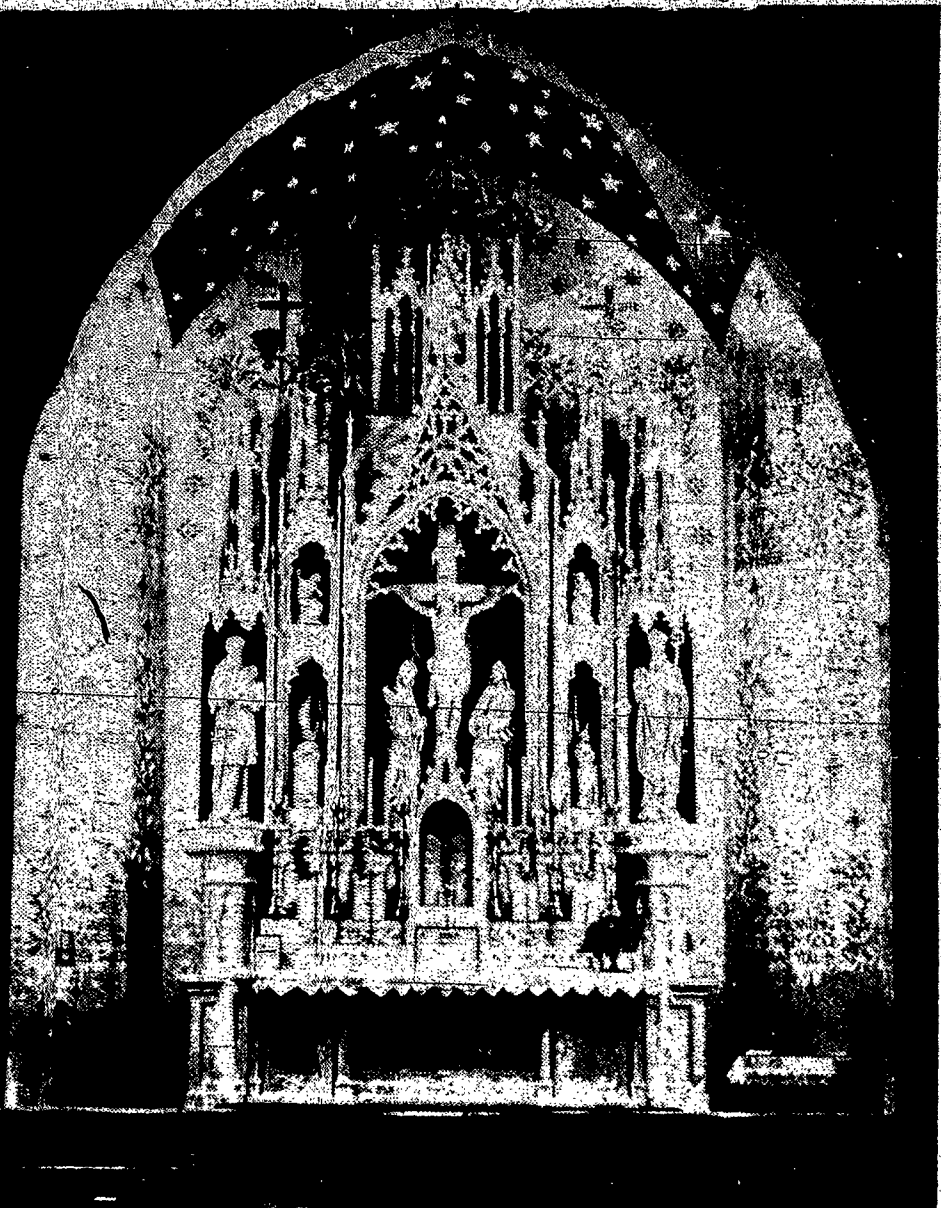
St. Joseph's Hospital alumnae will hold its annual dinner and dance at the Mark Twain Hotel on Saturday evening, June 6.

Alumni Unit Elects, Hears Education Talk

Corning — Corning's Catholic College Alumni Council elected officers for the coming year and heard a talk on Catholic education at its June 1 meeting in the Catholic League meeting room.

"The Place of Catholic Schools in Our American Democracy" was the subject discussed by the Rev. William M. Roche, associate superintendent of schools for the Rochester diocese.

As Catholics can never oppose public schools," he declared in stressing our democracy's need for an educated citizenry and citing examples of cooperation between public and parochial school education.

"THE FACT THAT" one out of every nine American school children is being educated in parochial schools is explained, he said, not by any hostility to public schools but by the desire of Catholic parents to raise and educate their children as good Catholics as well as good citizens. Such an education helps strengthen the moral fiber of our country.

Father Roche pointed out that while they reject the secularist dogma, American Catholics subscribe wholeheartedly to our Founding Fathers' concept of separation of church and state.

For this reason they hope that the day is coming when all faith-minded Americans will recognize the injustice of penalizing essentially parental rights which constitute a right of settling their children in parochial schools.

BOOK SHELF

Auburn Author

Rev. Matthew Swizdor, O.F.M. Conv., who said his first Mass at St. Hyacinth's, Auburn, in 1943, is hailed by all religious instructors (priests, teachers, catechists) for his newly issued popular explanation of Sacramental Grace, the "Baptized God in Me," which furnishes a fascinating series of blackboard diagrams and simple yet carefully detailed scientific experiments pointing up doctrine in unforgettable style.

THESE EXPERIMENTS (using sunlight through the classroom window, magnifying lens, charcoal wet, charcoal dry, and the like — or following the life-cycle of the caterpillar into his butterfly stage) have been successfully used for some years, and are accompanied with many practical notes and helps for the teaching of various age-levels.

The talks themselves are models of clarity and interest, and steeped in the beauty of God's word and the lives of the saints in their pilgrimage. Chapter VII, The Soul, finished by the Franciscan Fathers, of St. Hyacinth College, Branbury, Mass.

His sister Sally attended Nazareth College. His book is published by Water, Chapter II, The Grapevine of Jesus, Chapter VI, Light and Darkness. These are especially memorable.

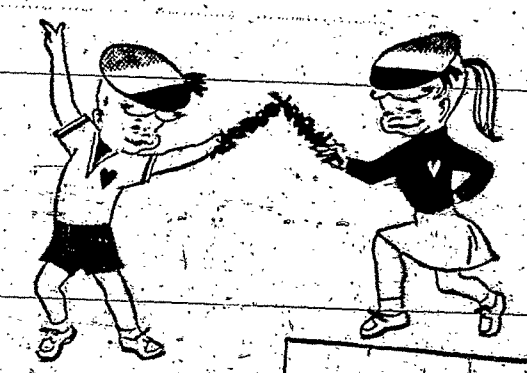
Senior Day on Wednesday evening, June 3, was a most successful affair. The seniors attended a banquet at the Mark Twain.
