### CRUSTY CURLS

Cover and let rise until light... about 1 1/2 hours. Punch down. Roll out into rectangles about 12 x 6 inches. Cut in strips 1/4 inch wide and 6 inches long. Oil the tops with the old wooden knobby kind... and wind strips of dough from top to bottom and fasten underneath. Place on greased cookie sheet to rise about 30 minutes. Bake at 400 degrees about 15 minutes. Remove from oven and brush with melted butter. Gently loosen the curls and pull them out. Mix cream cheese and mayonnaise and use to fill ends of crusty curls and serve. Yield: 24 curls.

### CONSERVE THE STRAWBERRY!

I want you (my readers) to have some of my favorite jam and jelly recipes. Strawberries will be in abundance probably in the very near future. It's important to make conserves, jams and jellies in small batches for perfect results and to preserve natural color and flavor. Make some Strawberry Conserve now and have about extracting some for Christmas giving. This favorite also has fresh pineapple and it's just wonderful!

### STRAWBERRY-PINEAPPLE CONSERVE

4 1/2 c. sugar  
1/2 t. salt  
2 c. crushed strawberries  
1 1/2 c. chopped ripe pineapple  
1-2 1/2 oz. box powdered fruit  
1/2 c. sliced almonds (blanched)  
Measure sugar, add salt and set aside, wash, drain, hull and crush berries. Wash, pare and chop fully ripe pineapple. Measure fruits into large (4 to 6 quart) saucepan. Add preserving mixture to fruit. Bring to a boil, stirring, add sugar and nuts. Bring back to fast boil 1 minute.
