158 Graduated In College Rites

A total of 158 young men and women received degrees last weekend from the Rochester Diocese's two Catholic colleges.

Nazareth College graduated 158 at commencement ceremonies held in the campus cafeteria on Monday. Rev. Lawrence McHugh, S.J., assistant editor of "Catholic magazine," was speaker.

The Honorable Kenneth B. Keating addressed the 64 graduates at St. John Fisher College Sunday afternoon.

BISHOP KEARNEY presided at both ceremonies.

Speaking to the young men of Fisher College, Senator Keating, who was present at the exercises, said: "This nation was created by men who were willing to risk their lives for concepts of political liberty based upon self-government under God."

"I remain the foundation stone of our national policy," he said.

"You are equipped with a splendid education," the senator told the graduates, "thanks to your devoted instructors at St. John Fisher College and all the teachers before them."

"You are equipped and fitted with the religious teachings, the moral principles, which your Church and your families have inculcated," he said.

At NAZARETH College, Father McHugh told the largest graduating class in the school's history, that "women should take advantage of the opportunities that is offered them to make the influence of the Gospel felt in the world."

Granted that women today do enjoy reverence and increasingly important status, do they take advantage of their opportunities?" Father McHugh asked.

"Catholic women do not take advantage of the opportunities that are offered to them," he stated, "they will leave the field open to other women, who will not influence society in accordance with the Christian principles, the ideals of Catholic College women."

Father Megivern Says First Mass

OEGOO—"A young man does not choose the priesthood. The priesthood, through a call from God, chooses the young man." These were words used in the sermon,

delivered at the First Solemn High Mass of Rev. James J. Megivern, C.M. at St. Patrick's Church, Sunday, May 31.

The sermon was given by Rev. William J. Gromley, C.M. of the Catholic University at Washington.

MONSIGNOR BOYLE told the graduates and an audience of over 500 that if an educated man is to do anything, it should teach a sense of values.

"If I should equip the young man starting out in life with the ability to analyze, to weigh carefully, to withhold judgment, until all the facts are known," Monsignor Boyle stated.

"It should enable him to steer his own course through life," he continued, "to discriminate clearly between changing more and unchanging morals. The produce of true education can distinguish quickly and accurately the shadow from the substance."
