St. Paul — (NC) — When Edmund Barry graduated with honors at the College of St. Thomas commencement, it marked one of the most remarkable achievements ever seen at the institution.

Ed Barry has never been in a college classroom. For four years, he attended the college by a telephonic hookup to a receiver at his bedside. He majored in accounting, and he ranks third in his class of 185.

Since birth, Ed has been bed-ridden with spina bifida, a split nerve in his spinal chord. He is legless.

**1000 Flights To Freedom**

New York — (NC) — Church representatives and Federal government officials extended a warm reception to 77 European refugees who arrived here aboard the 1,000th plane to carry refugees to the U.S.

The refugees flew from Munich, Germany, on the 1,000th U.S.-bound plane chartered by the 28-nation Intergovernmental Committee for European Migration.



**Anne Frank Refugee Village Begun**

Wuppertal, Germany — (RNS) — Father Dominique Georges Pire, O.P., of Belgium, helps lay the foundation stone for the Anne Frank Village in Wuppertal, Germany. Slain by his Otto Frank, father of the Jewish girl whose famed diary was dramatized throughout the world. This was the sixth of a series of villages for displaced persons built by Father Pire who won the Nobel Peace Prize last year. He gave half of the \$40,000 prize to help construct the Anne Frank center.

Vatican City — (NC) —

Pope John XXIII is marshaling the full support of the Holy See behind the World Refugee Year, it was revealed here.

The Pope himself will make a radio broadcast to the world in behalf of refugees on Sunday, June 28. It was also announced that the Pontiff is contributing funds to the United Nations refugee program.

In addition, it was learned that the Holy See will initiate a vast diplomatic action — by means of its representatives throughout the world — to encourage the various nations to undertake additional efforts to aid the remaining victims of war and persecution.

The State of Vatican City, meanwhile, is preparing to issue a series of postage stamps designed to emphasize the need for action in behalf of the refugees.

Pope John's refugee broadcast takes place on the day the World Refugee Year begins in much of the world. The U.N. General Assembly, in its resolution last fall calling for a World Refugee Year, suggested June 1959, as the beginning. But it set no specific date, and a number of countries begin their observances on June 28.

(The United Kingdom began its program on June 1, and President Eisenhower proclaimed World Refugee Year in the United States to coincide with the new fiscal year beginning July 1. Mr. Eisenhower expressed the hope that the World Refugee Year might be to the field of humanity what the International Geophysical Year was to the advancement of science.)

The moves undertaken by Pope John to muster the utmost support for the World Refugee Year are in line with both his own previous work in behalf of refugees and war victims and with the active lead of the Holy See itself.

The Holy See is one of the 24 member states of the new Executive Committee of the Program of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees. It was also a member of the predecessor body, the 21-nation United Nations Refugee Fund Executive Committee, which went out of existence at the end of last year.

The Holy See has also spurred Catholic support for such bodies as the Intergovernmental Committee for European Migration and the Standing Conference of Voluntary Agencies Working for Refugees. Members of the latter organization include the International Catholic Migration Commission, the International Conference of Catholic Charities and Catholic Relief Services-National Catholic Welfare Conference.

**To Prevent War — Keep Ties With Soviet Russia**

La Crosse, Wis. — Free nations of the world should not sever relations with the Soviet Union, Alfredo Cardinal Ottaviani counseled here.

The Cardinal, who is Pro-Secretary of the Sacred Congregation of the Holy Office, said that the best foreign relations policy is one designed to prevent the Soviet regime from going to war.

Cardinal Ottaviani visited here in his capacity as Cardinal-Proctor of the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration, whose mother house, St. Rose Convent, is in La Crosse.

"Would it do any good for the free nations of the world to isolate the Soviet Union?" he was asked.

"Absolutely not," he replied. "Should the world isolate the Soviet regime, then it would consider itself under siege. The net effect of such action would be to revive the revolutionary communist fervor."

The Cardinal said the West must continue to negotiate and to leave the door open for the Soviets to enter the polity of nations. "But he added that the West must guard against any compromise or concession that might encourage Soviet intransigence."

"The most important thing," he said, "is to keep contact — not to close the Soviet Union off."

Asked about communism's strength in Italy, the Cardinal said most of it stems from "the economic problems of many of the people."

But he said that thanks to the Marshall Plan and the efforts of Catholic Relief Services — National Catholic Welfare Conference, the communist danger has definitely subsided in Italy.

**Birth Control Protest Catholic Hospitals Quit Syracuse Health Council**

Syracuse — (RNS) — Two Roman Catholic hospitals here, St. Joseph's and St. Mary's, withdrew from the newly-formed Metropolitan Health Council because the Planned Parenthood Center joined it.

At the same time, Father Daniel Lawler, director of Catholic Charities for the Syracuse diocese, resigned from the council's 30-member board of directors.

Bishop Walter A. Foery of Syracuse, earlier expressed "shock and deep regret" that the group had admitted an organization that, he said, had artificial contraception as a major aim.

**Add 1 to 13 Fr. Morphy's Silver Jubilee**

A fourteenth priest of the Rochester Diocese will also mark his 25th anniversary in the priesthood this month. He is the Rev. Roy B. Morphy, pastor of St. Jerome's Church, East Rochester.

Last week the Courier Journal listed thirteen jubilarians, inadvertently omitting Father Morphy.

Father Morphy will mark his jubilee with a solemn Mass in his parish church Sunday, June 21 at 10 a.m.

Parishioners will honor him at a testimonial dinner and public reception the following Sunday, June 28, 2-3:30 p.m., at the East Rochester Catholic Youth Association hall.

During his nine years at St. Jerome's, Father Morphy has conducted three successful fund drives, each topping its goal, to finance redecoration of the church in 1950, construction of a school in 1953 and a convent in 1957.

Father Morphy initiated parochial school education in the now 69 year old parish by opening classes in 1952 in the CYA

hall prior to construction of the new school building in 1955.

He also modernized the rectory adjacent to the church.

A native of Clifton Springs, born Dec. 10, 1908, he is the son of William and Margaret Morphy and attended elementary school there and Auburn high school. He made his priestly studies at St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries and was ordained by Cardinal Mooney, fourth Bishop of Rochester, in old St. Patrick's Cathedral, June 9, 1934.

He served as assistant pastor first at Holy Family Church, Rochester, and then from 1942 at Corpus Christi Church. During his eight years as curate at Corpus Christi he also served as diocesan director of the Sodality of the Blessed Virgin Mary. He succeeded the late Rev. Bernard J. Getell as East Rochester pastor March 1, 1950.

Rev. L. Joseph Hogan of St. Bernard's Seminary will preach the jubilee sermon.
