Church Prince Greets King

New York — (RNS) — Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, chats with King Hussein of Jordan at St. Patrick's Cathedral. The young monarch, who is a Moslem, thanked the prelate for what the Catholic Church has done in the last ten years for the Palestinian Arabs living in refugee camps in Jordan. Cardinal Spellman gave the visiting King a check for \$5,000 "to alleviate the suffering of the poor and homeless in Jordan, regardless of race, color, creed."

FBI Role

Washington — (NO) — Cardinal Cushing of Boston gave high praise to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a tradition of "uncommon diligence" in fighting communism and crime.

The Cardinal also noted that FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover has just completed 35 years in the post and praised him for "uncommon service to a nation he deeply loves and the gratitude of which he so greatly deserves."

CARDINAL CUSHING was a speaker at Wednesday's graduating ceremonies of the 63rd session of the FBI National Academy. Eighty-six local law enforcement officers had completed the bureau's 12 weeks of intensive training in the latest methods of scientific law enforcement.

In his address, the Boston Cardinal noted that this has been termed "the age of the common man," but he said "a man of the century of literally 'common men' would be a disaster for civilization."

"Our need, our urgent compelling need at the moment is for uncommon men, men of uncommon devotion to the highest and best, the uncommon spiritual ideas and civic objections," he said.

The Cardinal termed the Communist Party in the United States "the greatest threat to our survival as a nation of free common men."

Delegates Study Migrants Needs

Washington — (NO) — Some 200 delegates at the first annual "Resettlement Council" symposium of the American Committee on Italian Migration were received at the White House by President Eisenhower before the opening of a two-day session here.

The representatives of 127 ACIM chapters in all sections of the country heard U.S. Sen. Kenneth B. Keating of Rochester laud the ACIM, which is affiliated with the National Catholic Resettlement Council, for its work in trying to bring together families separated by migration.

Gwynn, Nineteenth Century Europe; Dr. Robert Weidner, Psychology of School Music Teaching; and Dr. David Fetter, Analytical Technique. Private instruction will be available to students in the Music Department in piano, voice, organ, violin and other instruments.
